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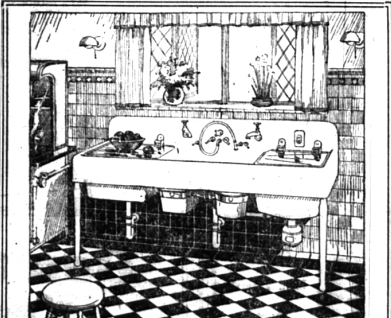


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# HUNTERS SEASON OPENS for Fox Squirrel and Pheasant tomorrow (October 25)
