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## IN WORLD OF SPORTS

Here's A Calendar Of Big Intercollegiate Football Games. But You Can't See Them All—Too Bad!

PERHAPS there has never been another form of athletics, football today is the representative intercollegiate sport, throwing together in competition teams of the south and east, the middle and west, and the east and middle west, and every other conceivable combination.

Where an intercollegiate game was a novelty 10 years ago, except to those rambling teams of Notre Dame, the 1929 season is marked by no less than 40 intercollegiate contests of major import.

The 1929 season finds Colgate making two distinct trips into the middle west, Harvard as the foe of Michigan at Ann Arbor and the Army the guest of Stanford on the Pacific Coast. Half a dozen strong southern teams will make trips into the east and west.

Notre Dame eleven still retain the name of "the Ramblers," at the same time upholding that school's traveling championship. For several seasons the University of Nebraska has been known as a school favoring intercollegiate games, while the name may be said of the University of Chicago, Princeton, Southern California and Georgia Tech.

The biggest day of intercollegiate tilts is Saturday, October 12. Vanderbilt plays at the University of Minnesota; Nebraska meets Syracuse in New York; Notre Dame meets the Y at Baltimore; Michigan State plays at Colgate in New York; Carnegie Tech of Pittsburgh encounters Western Kentucky at Cincinnati; St. Louis University is the guest of Georgetown University at Washington, D. C.; Miss Mac Breitmeyer is the secretary. The proceeds from the sale of magazine subscriptions will be used for athletic supplies.

into the middle west October 19 to meet Indiana University. At the same time Pitt plays at Nebraska, while the University of California makes a cross-country trip to meet the University of Pennsylvania at Philadelphia.

SATURDAY, October 26, finds only two intercollegiate games. Notre Dame plays Carnegie Tech at Pittsburgh, while Loyola of New Orleans plays at the University of Detroit.

Two members of the Big Ten conference go into the east for games November 2. Chicago meets Princeton while Ohio State plays Pittsburgh. At the same time the

University of Florida meets Harvard; South Dakota meets the Army; Notre Dame is at Georgia Tech, and Carnegie Tech meets Washington University at St. Louis.

The entire country has its eyes on the clash between the Army eleven and the University of Illinois in the Hill stadium November 5. Both teams are recognized as leaders of the grid sport in their sections. Other games that day are Harvard at Michigan, Mississippi at Purdue in Indiana, Georgia at New York University, and Western Reserve at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York.

ANOTHER intercollegiate contest of note is the annual tennis between the University of Southern California and Notre Dame at Chicago November 14. These two teams played before, 115,000 spectators on the same field two years ago and a greater attendance is anticipated this fall. Mississippi plays at New York University the same day, while Boston College goes to Milwaukee to meet Marquette.

Only two games are on for November 23. They are Ohio Wesleyan at the Army and Oregon Agleys at the University of Detroit.

The University of Washington eleven plays Coach Stagg Chicago Maroons at Chicago on Thanksgiving Day. Notre Dame meets the Army eleven in New York City November 30, while Georgetown University is guest of the University of Detroit the same day.

Other interesting games of intercollegiate favor, coming later in the season, are: Oregon University vs. Florida at Miami, December 7; Carnegie Tech at Southern California, December 14; and the Army at Stanford University, Palo Alto, California, December 28.
