Construction Company Completes Woodward Structure In Six Weeks

Construction of a one-story building on Woodward avenue between Maple and Willets is completed today by the Packard-Charleston building corporation. The building was erected in six weeks, which is considered record time.

It is so constructed that an additional story may be added when required. The front is of modernistic motif and was designed by Albert Kahn, Detroit architect. The remainder was designed by William H. Stone. It will be occupied immediately by the Atlantic & Pacific Tea company.

Brief Illness Fatal To Village Man Born In England

Albert W. Henry, 48, was buried Saturday in Roseland Park cemetery. Services were held at the residence, 525 South Woodward avenue, at 2:30 p. m. with C. J. Whitney, reader of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Birmingham, officiating.

Mr. Henry died at his home last Wednesday, following a brief illness. For the past five years he has lived in the village where he was employed as a decorator. He was a native of England, coming to America 35 years ago.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary Ann Henry; two daughters, Mrs. T. G. O'Neal and Albertina Blanch, and a son, John Pershing.

VILLAGE COMMISSION PROCEEDINGS

Official proceedings of a regular meeting of the Village Commission held Monday, Sept. 30th, 1929 at 8 o'clock P. M. Present: Commissioners Hersey, R. Allen, H. Allen, Hubert and Haysen. Absent: President Eberly and Commissioner White.

Minutes of meeting held Sept. 23, 1929 approved as printed with the following corrections:

595—Moved by Commissioner Hubert that the last paragraph of Ordinance No. 590 of the minutes of September 23, 1929 be corrected to read as follows: "Thereby making a total of \$45,472.18 street improvement bonds, to consist of 1 bond of \$672.18 and 65 bonds of \$1,000 denomination, to be issued in two lots in full, and payable \$12,572.13 October 1, 1930, \$13,000 October 1, 1931 and \$12,900 October 1, 1932 and \$13,000 October 1, 1933 and \$13,000 October 1, 1934."

596—Moved by Commissioner Halgren that the Resolution No. 228 of the minutes of September 1, 1929 be corrected as follows:

"District No. 171—A total of \$27,000, consisting of 27 bonds of \$1,000 denomination, numbers 1 to 27, both inclusive, and payable \$1,000 October 1, 1930, 1931 and 1932 and \$4,000 October 1, 1933 and 1934.

"District No. 170, a total of \$15,000, consisting of 50 bonds of \$1,000 denomination, numbers 1 to 50, both inclusive, and payable \$3,000 October 1, 1930, 1931, 1932, 1933 and \$4,000 October 1, 1934.

"And that the bonds for Districts No. 152 and 161 be not printed or issued."

603—Moved by Commissioner R. Allen that a hearing be held October 14 on the removal of two trees at 496 Southfield Avenue.

604—Moved by Commissioner R. Allen that the Village Manager be authorized to have trees in the right of way of alley numbers 1 and 2 removed with a public hearing.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication thereof.
