TABLE DECORATIONS FOR HALLOWE'EN

An invitation to a Halloween party always gives one a pleasant thrill. Whatever the evening hobnob fashion be, orange paper with twisted ends, or paper with pumpkin faces, or pumpkin breads can be used in the decorations. A buffet spread is the easiest to serve. A simple menu for evening might consist of sandwiches, pickles, olives, salad if desired, individual pumpkin pies, or doughnuts, cookies or cake and ice cream and coffee. A number of different sandwich fillings may be made, but it is always well to include some plain varieties like the time honored ham and plain turkey. Some recipes for the more elaborate kinds are printed here.

The Costumes

The hostess may appear dressed as a witch, or the entire company may be asked to come as witches and wizards, rats, or in similar costumes. A simple decorative scheme was adopted in the table pictured. Paper tablecloth and napkins in Halloween design are used, the centerpiece is simply a bowl of fruit with paper witches and black cats fastened thereto.

The combined place cards and favors are made by attaching the card to a roll of candies tied up in ribbon fashion in orange crepe paper with twisted ends.

Sets of paper are fastened to the backs of chairs in our illustration, but little paper pumpkin breads can be used instead if preferred.

Today's Recipes

Apple Rings With Bacon—Remove the core from two medium-sized cooking apples which have been thoroughly washed and dried. Slice in thin rings and, likewise, roll rings in corn meal and sprinkle with salt. Slip bacon slices through the apple rings and brown slowly in frying pan. When brown, sprinkle with sugar and serve white-hot.

Stuffed Eggplant—For a small eggplant cut a slice from top; if large, cut in half lengthwise; if move pulp, stem, drain. To each cup allow one-fourth teaspoon salt, dash of pepper, four tablespoons butter and one tablespoon cracker crumbs. Cover top with buttered crumbs. Bake 30 minutes.

Virginia Sliced Ham—One slice bacon, four slices each thick; one teaspoon mustard, two tablespoons brown sugar, one tablespoon vinegar, one cup water. Mix mustard and rub over surface of the ham. Place in baking pan and pour water and vinegar pan one. Bake in 400-degree oven one hour.

Horseradish Sauce—Four tablespoons grated horseradish, one teaspoon powdered sugar, one tablespoon vinegar. Mix and blend with one cup whipped cream.

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Newest Sports Wear Has Acquired Cut Of Regular Street Attire

THE new mode is by no means a flapper mode.

Many of the new models have youth in their every line and feeling. Many of them are created for the young woman barely out of her teens, but even these have a subtle trend toward the fashion era from which we have just emerged.

Sports wear makes much of feminine curves and feminine touches. The tweed suit may have a knitted jersey tuck-in blouse of figured pattern that, instead of being just a sweater, achieves sweet dignity by the use of a silk yoke and bow tie that match the tweed in color. Or, the daytime suit may become an individual thing by use of a feminine blouse that enhances the beauty of the wearer.

As a matter of fact, there seems to be less of a defined sports mode this autumn. Rather, sports wear has taken feminine cut and feminine finish until it approaches the grace of regular street attire. It is quite a fall to have a couple of extra, rather dressy blouses, to wear with the sport suit and completely convert it into a street costume.

THE blouses used with suits this season and the little frocks for daytime street wear are two of the newest and most interesting of the new modes.

For the blouses, figured silks, jersey, wash satins, brocades and heavy crepes, used in conjunction with hand-embroidery, are among the latest. Colorful wool designs are very good for the trendwork. One of the very smartest of the new blouses is a little double-breasted jacket blouse of figured green silk from Henri Bendel. The suit that the blouse was made for is a rough basket weave in dark green. The background of the plaid matches the suit and the plaid stripes are in satin. In dull gold, white and a light green.

This blouse fits the hips tightly, blouses slightly above the waistline, in both the front and the back. There is a shawl collar with triangular ends that tie twice to form a snug bow at the end of the V-neckline. The sleeves slope in to the wrist and have cute buttons

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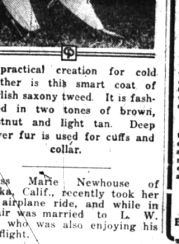
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
