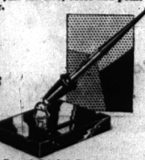

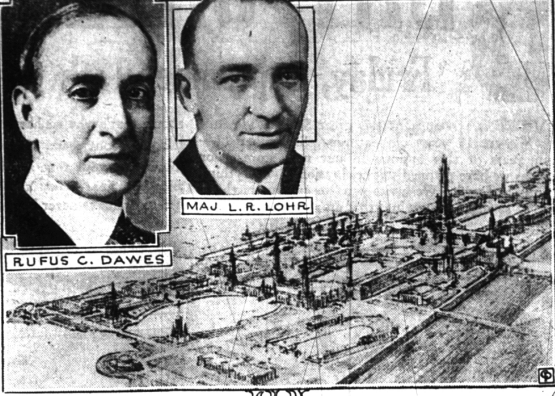
Tuesday evening, Sept. 6, the married men of the Baptist society give a social in the basement of their cozy, little church. A good time for all.

A CENTURY OF PROGRESS

Second Largest City Prepares For World's Exposition In 1933

 Chicago, Ill.—Fair maidens from Java, brown men from India, coolies from Japan and eskimos from the barren wastes of the far north will find their way to Chicago in 1933 and take up their abode on the midway, just as their predecessors did in 1893, the committee for the "Century of Progress" exposition promises.
 However, this world's fair, for which elaborate plans are being made, although it is four years distant, is not to be a string out series of competitive exhibits. It is to be purely scientific in character, portraying the "modern spirit" underlying the progress of each industry, agriculture, art, drama and sport. It is expected that the various industries centering in Chicago will have exhibitions of their own, thereby insuring a number of trade fairs scattered through the city.
Proposed Plans
 Contract plans provide for the construction of islands separated from the mainland by a lagoon and connected by bridges. In case this plan is abandoned the buildings probably will be constructed on pilings in the lake near the shore. The central building is to be devoted to pure science and radiating from it will be beautiful structures housing exhibits of applied science.
 Members of the committee, working under the direction of Rufus C. Dawes, president of the fair, who is a brother of Ambassador Charles G. Dawes, and Major L. R. Lohr, its manager, have planned a series of national and international conferences on matters of public interest, a festival of music, and a carnival of sports among other entertainments. It is expected many foreign governments will send exhibits and representatives.
 Back in '93, visitors to the fair had to depend upon boats and railroads for transportation. In 1933, when Chicago plans to celebrate the 100th anniversary of its incorporation as a municipality, thousands are expected to come by air and a special landing field near the fair grounds is to be constructed, to accommodate these modern travelers.
