HI GRIDDERS POINTED FOR PONTIAC TILT

Birmingham High School's football team will be picked shortly, according to Coach George F. Johnson. Selection of the grid-ers will be made at the latter part of this week or the early part of next in preparation for the fourth coming battle with Pontiac on their field Sept. 21.

Forty-five men have turned out for the sport. This is an advance of nine over the 36 who reported the end of last week. Preliminary signal practices are under way, and at the beginning of this week Coach Johnson had three teams running signals.

CIRCULATION DRIVE STARTS AT BALDWIN

Maroon and White Goal is 500 Subscriptions; Many On Staff

Five hundred subscriptions is the goal of the circulation staff of the Maroon and White, official publication of Baldwin High School. It is announced by Tom Martindale, circulation manager. Of the school's 650 students it is estimated that it will be possible to secure this many orders for the paper.

An extensive campaign is being made by the circulation staff, with the co-operation of the remainder of the paper's large staff of both Senior High and Junior High students. Practically all of the faculty have already signed or signified their intention of doing so.

Considerable expansion of the paper will follow if the goal is reached. The size of the pages is now at its largest, owing to the size of the school presses, but the number of pages will be increased if necessary and a number of new and unusual features will be added, it is planned.

Working with Martindale are Catherine Carr, Barbara Jackson, and Kara Mae Keller as solicitors, Ward Conwell as publicity manager, and assistant circulation manager, and Earl Morrow, assisted by Jack Payton, in the Junior High circulation department.

MILITARY DIRECTOR NAMED FOR BAND

Military training of the Birmingham High School band has been taken over by Will Bevan, it is announced by A. W. Berndt, bandmaster. Mr. Bevan, who is a resident of Birmingham, has had charge of two high school R. O. T. C. bands and an army band during the war.

Yesterday the band began its regular marching practice preparatory to the fall season of activities, which include particularly playing at football games. The organization has been granted police permission to use the four blocks of Merrill, Chester, Townsend and Bates streets around the Public Library, three rooms a week for this practice. Mr. Bevan will conduct this drill in addition to the other work to which he is devoting his time.

SCHOOL REPORTS RECORD CLASS

A record enrollment is reported today for both day and evening classes at the Pontiac Business Institute.

In addition to the pupils from Pontiac a large number of towns are represented, including Birmingham, Clawson, Orion, Kingstons, Clinton, Indiana, Alma, Lapeer, Canse, Marysville, Clarkston, Wilnot, Mason, Chalk River, Ontario, South Haven, Oxford, Clifford, Holly, Crosswell, Imler City, Sandusky, Marquette, North Branch, Milford, Wall Lake, Rochester, Brighton, Ulley.

In order to take care of the enrollment an extra teacher has been added to the faculty, so that the faculty now includes two teachers giving full time to bookkeeping, accounting and business subjects, and two devoting their time to shorthand and typewriting. In addition to this the principal assistants with instruction in the business department. Additional instructors are also employed in the evening classes.

The increased enrollment has made it necessary to equip an additional recitation room.

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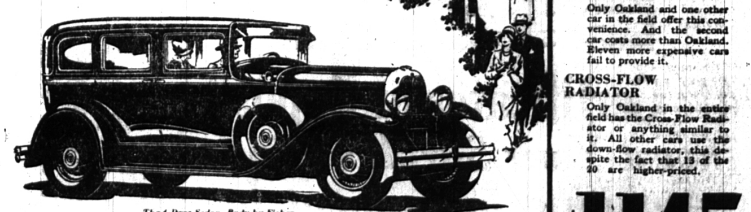
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FISHER BODY
