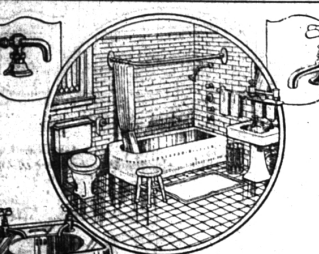

The WORLD and All

OLD BAILEY
A day at Old Bailey courts and Newgate Prison. Here the most notorious pirates were imprisoned and tried. Here many of the most noted footpads and highwaymen of old times were hanged. I am shown the very window outside of which the gallows used to stand. I visit many of the old cells in which robbers, cutthroats and pirates were confined. There was a time when it went hard with a malefactor in England! Prison reform was unknown, and murderers were not lodged in steam-heated hostels with a reading lamp and radio in every room. It is not of record that these prisoners ever turned communist and went on strike, burning their hostilities and shooting down their guards. Well, times change, within prison as well as without.

I sit with my barrister friend on the barristers' benches, and listen to a trial and several arraignments.
The trial judge, in black robe, long white wig and white collar with high "dickey," sits upon a high bench, somewhat like the judicial benches in America. Beside him sits the High Sheriff, in red robe with what appears to be beaver fur trimmings. In front of the judge is always a bouquet. It is explained to me that in former times this "nose-gay" was furnished the judge to keep him from being overcome by the odor of the unshowered prisoners, just dragged in from long confinement in damp cells.
All the barristers wear black robes and white wigs. So do the clerks (clerks) and bailiffs and ushers. Witnesses stand in the "witness box," while giving testimony.

The prisoner comes up a stairway into the dock, a fence-in box in the center of the court-room, when his name is called. He is an old man, white and trembling. He was assistant postmaster at a London substation, and was almost due to retire on a good pension when he was caught stealing almost worthless packages from the mails. He admits the facts. He says he does not know why he did it. The prosecutor isn't hard on him. He

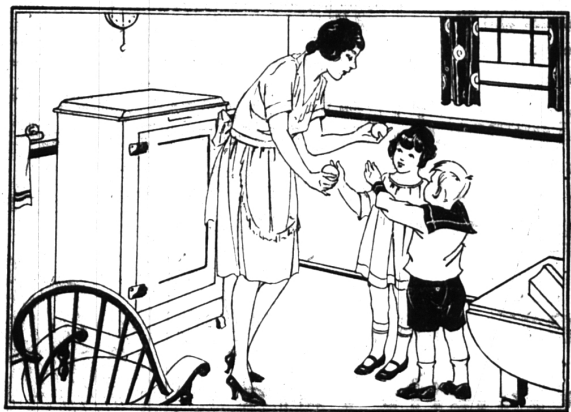
