## COUNTY POOR COMMISSION MEMBER ADDRESSES COUNCIL

Dr. Charles Bird, of the Oakland County poor commission, was the speaker Tuesday at the opening meeting of the Oakland County Council of Women at the Community House.

His work with the commission was the subject of his talk. For 17 years Dr. Bird has worked with the commission, the last five years being employed in a full time capacity. "In all my experience I have found that my most difficult work has been with persons who come here from other states, have become ill and have lost their positions. It then falls upon the county care for them or to send them back to their homes," he said.

Dr. Bird's talk confines him to the infirmary for the entire time, he said. He told of the overcrowded conditions of the infirmary. The infirmary was built five years ago when the population of the county was approximately 12,000. Today the same infirmary is called upon to serve the needs of a county of more than 400,000.

He also mentioned the work of the University hospital, at Ann Arbor. "There has been some criticism of the commission by persons feeling that certain cases should be sent to Ann Arbor," he said.

Dr. Bird also explained that only children under 21 be sent to Ann Arbor at the state's expense. "Dr. Bird also explained that the infirmary hospital is not equipped for operations."
