Because the voices were judged best of all contestants for radio singing, the two will appear in Detroit next month during the state audition. Following this state audition, the winners will receive an award of \$5,000 and two years tuition at a conservatory.

He was graduated from the Baldwin High School in 1928 after gaining a reputation at most musical functions in the school where his rich baritone voice won him many admirers. OAKLAND COUNTY NEWS

Slow developments in the finishing of the structure are expected to retard the opening of the new Oakland County Juvenile Detention Home, county officials said today. The building, being erected on the Telegraph road amid a group of county structures, will not be opened until November, it is indicated at present. The completion date had been October 15.

Present officials of Oak Park village will be unopposed for reelection at the annual municipal election Oct. 7, it was announced today by Fred B. Yehle, village clerk. Registration closes Sept. 28.

Nomination petitions had been received for only the incumbents when the period of filing closed. They are:

Charles R. Raine, president. James Fisher, commissioner. Clarence Kirby, commissioner. Harold T. Weber, treasurer. Fred B. Yehle, clerk. Two commissioners, Chester Briel and William Cameron, hold over for another year, having been elected to two-year terms last fall.

The total enrollment of the Hazel Park schools, to date, has reached 3,559. The largest number of pupils is enrolled in the United Oaks school which has a total of 1,038. Other schools, in order of their numbers, are: Hazel Park high school, 781; Martin road school, 735; Wanda school, 545; Hoover school, 478; and Campbell Park school, 82.

Royal Oak city will pay a school tax rate of \$15 for each \$1,000 valuation this December, and increase of 50 cents over last year, the board of education determined in approving a net budget of \$555,101 for last year. The raise in tax rate is due to a decrease in the assessed valuation of the city. Supt. Frank Hendry pointed out, there would be no increase in the school rate.

According to figures contained in the monthly health report issued today from the Oakland County Department of Health by Dr. John D. Monroe, Royal Oak Township again showed the greatest incidence of communicable diseases during the month of August, having 39 more cases than were reported by any other township in the county.

Farmington has an opportunity to have construction on the Farmington Drain started within 30 days, according to County Drain Commissioner Arthur W. Spencer, whose office is prepared to proceed with the work on short notice. In addition, everyone in Farmington Township and City may have the further opportunity of learning all about the plans in detail before construction is begun.

Commissioner Spencer having promised to come to Farmington next Monday evening with a member of his staff and describe the proposed work in detail, answering any questions that may be asked.

Officials of the Farmington Methodist Church are planning to celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of the beginning of Methodist preaching and regular services in the community of Farmington. This date will be October 27 and the week following.

Northville-Wayne County Fair started on Tuesday and continued through until Saturday night at 12 o'clock, Sept. 21. Never before has Northville worked so hard to make its fair a success as this year. Week-end men have been working at the fair grounds building new buildings, moving horse sheds, grading down the center field, painting the fair buildings and erecting new exhibition rooms for the 1929 fair.

Work has practically been completed on the new athletic field for Farmington High School, and finishing touches are being put on the grounds, but the field will not be in shape for football this fall, according to officials.

A change in the original plans for widening of Grand River avenue, and one which will be highly beneficial to Farmington has been made by the State Highway Department, it was learned. Under the new plans, Grand River avenue will be paved with two 40-foot strips of concrete from the Cut-off to Farmington Junction, instead of with two 30-foot strips, thus eliminating the reduction in width of the main highway at the Cut-off, which would have resulted if the earlier specifications had prevailed.

Arthur Rusk, an aged farmer living between Metamora and Hadley, Lapeer county, was drowned Sunday in saving the life of a woman who was swimming in an artificial lake.

Word has been received of the death of Joseph C. Hummer, at Spokane, Washington. Mr. Hummer had been ill for about six months. The deceased was the son of the late J. M. and Veronella G. Hummer, and a brother of the late Mrs. J. H. Lomerson of Orion. He was born in Orion Township March 18, 1874.

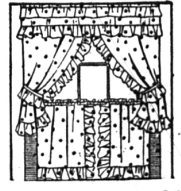

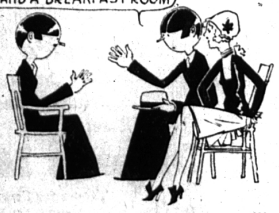
