## JOHNSON SEES VICTORY IN PONTIAC TILT

Heavy, Well-Conditioned Team To Take Field Saturday

NEW MEN TO START

After an intensive 10 days practice, Coach George J. Johnson will lead his Baldwin High School gridgers against Pontiac High at the latter's field next Saturday at 4 p. m., confident of a good chance for victory.

The probable starting line-up is given by Coach Johnson as follows:—**BE**—Rainey, **RT**—McDonald, **EG**—Morgan, **CM**—McClelland, **EG**—Smith, **LT**—Ford, **LE**—Neal, **QB**—Schwartz, **HB**—Brien, **HB**—Winborn, **FB**—Gore. Other possible starters are: Ends—Elberly, Shave, and Wedge; Tackles—McCleure and Moore; Guards—Moffatt, Carter, Gibbs; Backs—Deer, Harris, McAlpine, and Stone.

The Birmingham squad will be much heavier than the team that marched onto the field last year, although six veterans remain. The crew will feel the loss of Doherty,

Cox, Kurth, Wasey, and others, but Johnson has promising men to fill their positions. The six veterans, with the reserve gridgers of last year, furnished able material.

Aided from the six veterans the team needs considerable practice, but after the first game they will have acquired enough to acquaint them with the most prevalent errors, Johnson feels.

"The team is decidedly inexperienced and it is impossible to tell how it will perform, there being no previous practice games," Coach Johnson said. "The boys are in fine physical condition and should give a good account of themselves," he said. He also stated that the townspeople and the students can do much for the team by attending the games and offering support.

The team will go through a light workout tomorrow and rest in preparation for the game Saturday.

## DEBATING TRY- IN MEET TODAY

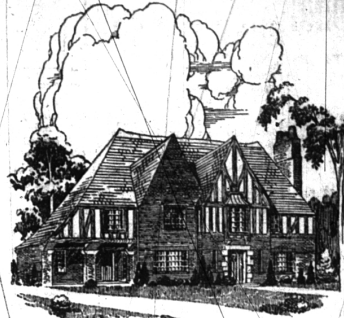
Corrovert To Look Over New Material This Afternoon

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## Little Chats About Your Health

## AVOIDING RINGWORM

A physician says that the epidemics of ringworm which so often occur during the summer are caused by a fungus found in every "Gymnasium, locker room and shower room of clubs, public resorts, high schools and colleges."

Ringworm may attack the scalp, face, trunk or extremities and is often characterized by deep seated blisters and intense itching.

Preventive measures recommended consist in wearing bedroom slippers instead of going barefooted in dressing rooms and by the use of personal towels.

Before any treatment, the diagnosis of ringworm should be made by a physician as a number of diseases closely simulate fungus infections and may be mistaken for them.

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
