

R. R. Plans Lauded By Villagers

RAPID GROWTH IS EXPECTED TO FOLLOW WORK

Crowd Expected At Camp Dedication

Influx Of Residents To Suburbs Will Start, Many Believe; "All Ready," Parry Says

Announcement of the one hundred million dollar plan of the Grand Trunk Railway was received with enthusiasm here today when villagers were told of the electrification of the railway and the construction of a large speedway over the tracks running from Detroit to Pontiac.

Some of their comments follow: Commissioner George E. Reahm, Bloomfield Hills, village: "That speedway is a corking idea. It is just what the people of the hills want. It will save all sorts of time for those who drive into Detroit daily and the small toll charge will be willingly paid to avoid traffic."

President H. T. Ellerby, Birmingham: "It is good news. Birmingham will develop much faster when it has more ways of quicker communication to Detroit."

Manager James W. Parry: "The village is prepared for a great growth when the improvements are completed. It should, more than double its population in a few years."

E. H. Tillotson, president Birmingham Real Estate Board: "It will be a wonderful thing for the village. It will become more like the suburbs of New York City such as East and West Orange, N. J."

John B. Howarth: "This announcement means more to Birmingham than anyone can realize at this time. Our village will become part of the metropolitan area with a population of the better class."

Charles J. Shain: "If the proposed plans of the Grand Trunk

will do more than any other factor possibly could to create property values in the Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills district. The speedway is going to prove particularly valuable to the business man who wishes to drive into the city and get avoid the highway traffic."

W. A. P. John, Tooting lanes: "If one thing has retarded the development of Birmingham it is the transportation situation. The rapid transit and the speedway will offer two solutions to this problem. There are many persons of a high type now living in Detroit who refuse to live 45 to 60 minutes away from their office. It is this type of person who will be attracted to Birmingham by the Grand Trunk announcement."

Mrs. Hope Halgren, village commissioner: "In Detroit there are many persons awaiting the installation of the Grand Trunk rapid transit before building homes in this area. The recent announcement which offers not only the rapid transit but a speedway for automobiles will have a tremendous effect upon the village. Within five years the population will probably have more than doubled. Women also will recognize this as an added feature in selecting Birmingham as their home. They will be able to retain many of the old contacts which they value."

Ralph Stone, "Stonelea," Bloomfield Hills: "Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills are bound to develop rapidly. In that Bloomfield Hills village is able to restrict its property the Grand Trunk announcement will bring a desirable element into this territory."

Frank Mulholland: "I look for a population of 20,000 persons within five years. The announcement is a wonderful thing for the village. It will become more like the suburbs of New York City such as East and West Orange, N. J."

Start In Morning. The crowd of 200 persons will meet the morning of Oct. 5 at the Holland Hotel in East Texas. They will make a tour of the forest, guided by R. G. Schreck of the conservation department. Dinner will be served at the Y. M. C. A. camp across the lake and in the evening illustrated talks will be given by Mr. Schreck, on forest development in the state, Walter Hastings and James McGilvary, all members of the conservation department.

The eight trustees will meet Sunday morning. They are: Mr. Shain, Mr. Seaholm, Frederick Madison, Maurice Cole, Otto Sachse, Charles Merz, George T. Hendrie and Dr. Fred Baker.

Plan Tour. A tour of the camp site of 427 acres will be made before guests are called to the barbecued lunch at noon. The dedication will be started immediately after lunch under the direction of Mr. Shain who will speak on the development plans for the camp. A brief talk will be made by the presidents of the town and country, Birmingham, Pontiac and Royal Oak Township Y. M. C. A., in the order following: Elmer E. Van Tyne, G. A. Ziegler, Fred Farmer and Fred Cowan.

The speaker for the dedication ceremonies is expected to be selected next week, Mr. Lynd said.

Asks Club Hut. Members of the Birmingham Exchange club Tuesday noon, following a talk on the new Oakland County Y. M. C. A. camp at Loon Lake, near Hale, informally agreed among themselves to accept Charles J. Shain's suggestion to build, in the name of the Exchange club, a \$600 hut on the property. The club's intentions mark the first of a number of huts that are to be asked by the "Y" committee from various service clubs throughout Oakland County.

Mr. Shain, who is president of the county group that obtained the camp site, also spoke on the problem of financing the project; Birmingham's share of the entire \$36,000, which covers the cost of

the 427 acres of land and several main buildings, amounts to \$9,000.00. Of this amount several thousand dollars have already been pledged, reports Mr. Shain. Persons interested in making contributions to the camp site, in five annual payments, may obtain pledge cards from Mr. Shain, or some other member of the local Y. M. C. A. board of directors.
