

### YOUTHS JAILED FOR SHEEP THEFT

Birmingham Man Discovers Unusual Form Of Thievery

Two youths are serving 70 day sentences in the Oakland County jail following their arrest as sheep thieves after a discovery made by David Bell, of Birmingham. They are John Reynolds, 22, and

Fred Reynolds, 18, his brother, both of Highland Park. They attempted to sell the sheep to Mr. Bell who became suspicious when he saw initials on the skins. He called deputies who made the arrest. Sentence was passed by Justice Henry W. Harpster of municipal court who also ordered the youths to pay a fine of \$50 each. AN EARLY DRIVE

"The Compact With the Charter and Laws of the Colony of New Plymouth: Together With the Charter of the Council at Plymouth," is most of the title of an old leather-bound book I found, all buried in dust, in a private library in Boston. The library was being sold piecemeal, and I was hunting for anything about pirates. But this item was too good to pass up. It cost me 50 cents. While the old volume is full of interesting items, I happened to open it today at random, and found evidence of the initiation of one of the very first "drives" for college funds in this country. It is dated 1672, and is part of the record of the court of the jurisdiction of New Plymouth. I quote from it.

"We being informed that it is upon the hearts of our neighbours of the Massachusetts Colonie to support and encourage that nursery of Learning at Harvard College in Cambridge in New England from whence have through the blessing of God issued many worthy and useful persons for publique service in Church and Commonwealth; being also informed that divers Godly and well affected in England are rely to assist therein by way of contributing considerable summes provided the Country heer are forward to promote the same; and that the severall Townes in Massachusetts have bene very free in their offerings thereunto; we also being by letters from them invited and incited to joyne with them in so good a worke and that we may have an interest with others in the blessing that the Lord may please from thence to convey unto the Country; this Court doth therefore earnestly comend it to the Ministers and Elders in each Towne, that they taking such with them as they shall thinke meet; would particularly and earnestly move and stir up all such in their severall townes as are able to contribute unto this worthy worke be it in money or other good pay; and that they make a returne of what they shall effect heerin unto the Court that shall sit in October next who will then appoint meet persons to receive the contributions and faithfully dispose of the same for the ends proposed."

### 6 HELD IN BAIL AFTER RAIDS

Woman Also Fined By Buck Following Deputy's Activities

Six Pontiac men are held under bail today following arraignment before Justice Floyd S. Buck on charges of violating the prohibition law. One woman was also arrested in the raids made by Oakland County deputies which netted the seven persons.

The woman, Bettie Atkins, 28 years old, 1816 Second avenue, Flint, pleaded guilty to being disorderly and was given a sentence of 20 days in jail or a fine of \$25. Angelo Ponchetti, 32 years old, Lake Angelus, 30 years old, 86 Lull street, Joe Walters, 37 years old, 28 Glenwood avenue, Len Irwin and Elmer Irwin, both of 119 Oak Hill street, all pleaded not guilty to prohibition law violation counts. Their examinations were set for Oct. 1. Nicholas was held on \$1,500 bail and the other three had bail fixed at \$1,000.

Harold Christian, 24 years old, 117 Oakland, arraigned on a charge of keeping a place violating the prohibition law pleaded not guilty and his examination was set for Oct. 1 with bail fixed at \$1,000. All seven offenders were taken into custody by deputies Floyd Harger and Clayton Stokes in a series of raids Thursday afternoon.
