

Johnson's Men Win Pontiac in Opener

Baldwin Gridders Trample Rivals 7-6 In Fast Tilt

Coach George Johnson's Baldwin High School football team opened its season by scoring the Pontiac gridders to a 7-6 defeat and widening its margin of victory over that team last Saturday afternoon at Winsler Field, Pontiac.

The Maroons displayed much stamina throughout the game but failed to reach their usual standard of skill. The Birmingham men, however, recognized many of their blunders during the first half and showed considerable improvement in the second stanza though they were held in uncertain positions many times by the Orange gridders.

Good Passing—A passing was a ground gained for both teams. Birmingham, however, completed many more punts and passes than Pontiac. Pontiac men were strong on interference and surpassed Johnson's Birmingham line was stronger and held the opponents to three and four yard gains, very seldom letting a man through for more than five yards, while they themselves crashed the Orange line for several 15 and 20 yard jumps. The Maroons also led in first downs, completing 13 to Pontiac's 7.

Capt. H. Schwaz opened the game with a high kick-off to Capt.

breach in the Maroon line and went through for 11 yards.

The Baldwin men held fast all the way down the field, always tackling the Pontiac ball carrier before he could start. Birmingham was in the most dangerous position of one game, having about three minutes to play and the Pontiac players holding the 15 yard line. The Orange lost the ball to Birmingham who wasted no time in advancing it to their own 35 yard line. Another penalty was being inflicted on the Maroons when the final gun brought the contest to a close with Birmingham victorious in the first game of the season.

Another unsuccessful pass, this time from Schweizer to Winborn gave Birmingham possession of the ball again. Schwarz and Gore plunged through on off-guard thrusts for a first down. Jeremy received a punt from Schwarz and dodged and scrambled his way to the Birmingham 15 yard mark. Shortly after, the gun announced the end of the first half.
