# MAN JAILED FOR DRIVING WHILE DRUNK

Sentence Of 75 Days Given Villager In Pontiac Court

## LICENSE IS REVOKED

John C. Lofstedt, 35, of 458 Harmon avenue, today is in the Oakland County jail at Pontiac under a 75 day sentence on a drunk driving charge. He was sentenced by Justice Henry W. Harper, in Pontiac municipal court.

The man was found guilty after a trial. His driver's license was ordered revoked by the justice for one year.

The sentence is in keeping with the policy of Justice Harper to send all men convicted of driving while drunk to jail for 75 days without the option of a fine.

# COUNTY MOVES ITS OFFICES IN PONTIAC

Lease Taken On Quarters In New Bank Building

## SUPERVISORS ACT

Three county departments are to be housed in the third floor of the new Peoples State Bank building, Pontiac, recently leased by the county at \$9,000 a year. The move under the action Monday of the county supervisors upon a recommendation of the board of auditors.

The county auditors will be moved from the Court House annex, the drain commissioner's department from its present quarters in the Pythian Building and the West Hume street and Will B. Narrin, assessment clerk of the road commission, from quarters on Saginaw street.

Offices to be vacated by the auditors are to be used by other county departments that are overcrowded.

## Auditor's Report

Your board of county auditors desires to call your attention to the fact that the third floor of the Peoples State Bank building was rented by the Board of Auditors at the direction of the Board of Supervisors under date July 11, 1928, read the report to the supervisors. "This floor was rented for the county treasurer's office on the recommendation of Floyd H. Losee, the county treasurer at that time, and you as a Board of Supervisors believed that it was necessary for these offices to be relieved to the congested condition in the county treasurer's office."

"But as you know, Mr. Loser left the office on Jan. 1 of this year and A. W. Willson became county treasurer. Mr. Willson does not desire to occupy these offices for the reason he believes he has rearranged his offices to such an extent that he will be able to handle all of his affairs in the present office space. Further, it would be unnecessarily inconvenient in his opinion, for the reason that the register of deeds would not be situated near him; and after conferring with the register of deeds this board believes there would not be room for both offices on the same floor inasmuch as both have to have considerable vault space."

## Recommendations

"Therefore this board feels that inasmuch as the offices have been rented under lease that the floor might be occupied by some offices and still further we call your attention to the fact that at the present time the drain commissioner's office is rented in the K. of P. Building at a rental of \$1,980 per year but this rent is from month to month. We are also renting offices for the assessment clerk of the road commission in a building on Saginaw street at \$200 per year. We believe that both of these offices should be moved to the new bank building. We further find that the Board of County auditors' offices are crowded and we believe it would be to the best interest of the county to make the following recommendations to your honorable board: That the drain commissioner's

## offices be moved; that the assessment clerk to the road commission move his office; that the auditors' office be moved to the Peoples State Bank Building, and that offices to be vacated by the Board of Auditors be used by other departments that might be overcrowded. Sketches have been prepared as to locations for these various departments. We recommend to your honorable body that the Board of County Auditors be instructed to move the various offices as indicated."
