The open season for entertaining is at hand. After the summer vacation, it is customary for friends to meet for tea or dinner at one another's homes—exchange conversational pleasantries—and play bridge.

The prospective hostess has many things to keep her occupied. The question of a suitable repast, of having it well served, of having her house look its best. And, if she is a wise hostess, she will attempt to look her best—without making her guests feel uncomfortable.

The woman who entertains should never overdress. If it is to be a late dinner and she has a big home—with dancing to follow, she may make it a formal gathering but in that event should appreciate her guests of this fact. But if it is an early dinner, with bridge to follow, her good taste may be questioned if she greets her guests, garbed in a very elaborate evening gown.

Lace is as popular, if not more so, this fall, for semi-formal functions. It is a lovely material to wear, and may be had in beautiful colors. The one pictured, with its

surplice-cape effect neckline is flattering and gracious. Velvet is another material that fits into several categories, for both semi and strictly formal wear, depending upon its color and texture. On the other hand, tulle and pastel chiffons are in the truly frolic class.

Flat crepe, made along semi-tailored, floating lines, in either dark or pastel colorings is adaptable and attractive for the home party. Silver or gold cloth, with a suspicion of pastel coloring against its ground, is utilized this fall for afternoon and dinner dresses, but in both instances it is simply tailored and lacks other ornamentation. Black chiffon is always practical and because of its suppleness, offers many beautiful variations in line—especially when it is combined with other material, such as lace or tulle.

Early September Is The Time To Purchase Coats If You Know The Fall Styles

BUYING winter clothes now is an excellent thing to do if one has the money to spend them. For early September bargains really are bargains, usually, provided the buyer knows exactly what she wants.

Fur coat sales, especially, are advantageous, and because they have gone into the style forecasts, knows the fur she wants, the cut and color.

Suits that are bought early often cannot be duplicated later at anything near the summer bargain price. But here, too, Misses, must know the modes or she may find herself wearing a suit unlike those she sees and wants later.

Certain style points may be cited as guides in buying bargains. For fur coats, the silhouette, collar and cuff treatments, the length and fullness are the essential points.

WHILE comparatively few furs go in for exaggerated princess lines, there is a tendency all along the line to emphasize the waist line, with more fullness above and below. The width of fur coats this year, at their bottom edges, exceeds last season by from six to 10 inches. In length, too, they are more generous. Most fur coats lack severe lines below the knees, though there will be some jackets and three-quarters swagger coats.

Shawl collars, high cushion collars in contrasting furs, deep pointed cuffs, puff cuffs and flaring ones are in vogue.

THE cape collar of self fur is perhaps the newest thing in collar designs. A black broadtail coat of real distinction uses a deep self-cape-collar that can be worn buttoned up tight under the coloring or worn in surplice shawl effect in front. This coat is elegant in its slightly wider than the sleeves they finish. There is real roominess in the coat, so Missy need not fear this winter that her knees will be cold when she sits down.

Even straight line coats, of which there will be many, are fuller and tend to belt themselves with suade at natural waistline.

All the established furs appear, mink, muskrat, beaver, chinchilla, summer ermine, seal, leopard, skunk. Lapin is the big sports fur, dyed practically any color from banana yellow to pastel tones for the woman who has several coats.

If one is buying a winter suit, the three-quarter coat is the prevailing mode. There are shorter and longer suit coats, but the three-quarters is the new one. It may not become certain figures and if it does, the buyer makes a mistake to choose it.

Skirts have some fullness, more often than not, usually in the form of pleats in front, on the sides, all around or in irregular panels.

A smart new duvetya suit for fall and winter is Patton brown, a kind of eggplant brown with purple in it. It has a semi-circular skirt, on a yoke, and its three-quarters coat is collared in a scarf of dyed lapin.

Losing Tan Is Problem Of Autumn

Sun-tan has been more popular this year than ever before. But if you have acquired the natural tan—and not merely the artificial—it may be unbecoming; or uneven—or you may decide that it is out of character with your role in life; or your new fall clothes, in vivid sports togs, a bronzed complexion is lovely—the autumn is more formal—its colors richer and more somber—harmonizing better with a clear and radiant skin. Freckles that were alluring as accident kisses of the sun with background of gag summer frocks, become blemishes once they are brought into the drawing room and the formal social life of autumn.

It is much easier to acquire a coat of tan or a sprinkling of freckles than it is to get rid of them. However, persistence and the right treatment will work wonders. You can do something by washing the face with a mixture of one part lemon and two parts water, but it is much easier and more efficacious to use the really scientific bleaching preparation that have been prepared for you.

The regime is simple. Cleanse the face and neck—don't, please don't overlook the neck—with a special cleansing and bleaching cream or, if your skin is oily, wash with a bleaching soap. Then smooth on a film of freckle cream and leave on for half an hour. If your skin is very tanned or badly freckled, you may use a bleaching lotion which is stronger than the freckle cream and intended for extreme cases. And if you are in a great hurry—why then you may use both the freckle cream and the bleaching lotion at different times during the day.

Bleaching is always a little bit tiring and the bleaching lotion the skin is liable to be very dry anyway. So be most careful with your lubricating and nourishing part more attention to them than you would at any other season.

Don't forget your beautifying skin food, for to be beautiful, the skin must be clear and radiant as well as fair—and the beautifying skin food clears and animates, helps the skin to throw off all impurities. You may apply the beautifying skin food the last thing before going to bed and you may leave it on overnight if this is convenient. If not, keep it on at least fifteen or twenty minutes for it is a wonderfully good friend to the skin!

If you're wise—and most women are in the autumn, having learned their beauty lesson from summer's ravages—you will protect your skin always before you go out! Yes, the winds of autumn will devitalize almost as badly as the summer sun—and there's not much wisdom in bleaching if you are going right out to expose your skin all over again, is there? So

MENU HINT
Chicken in Batter, Corn Pudding, Tomato and Cucumber Salad, Apple Pie, Cheese Coffee
This menu will serve four.

Today's Recipes
Chicken in Batter—Make a batter of two eggs, one-third cup milk, one-half teaspoon salt, pepper and enough flour to make a medium thick batter. Cut apart a young, raw chicken and roll each piece in the batter. Fry in deep fat until tender and the crust is brown.

Baked Corn Pudding—Two cups corn, two beaten eggs, two tablespoons melted butter, one tablespoon sugar, one-half teaspoon salt and two cups milk. Beat eggs slightly; mix all together. Set dish in pan of water, bake until firm (about one-half hour) in a moderate oven. Do not overcook.

Tomato and Cucumber Salad—Slice cucumbers and tomatoes and serve with jellied mayonnaise made as follows: By soaking one teaspoon gelatine in two tablespoons cold water for ten minutes. Then dissolve it over hot water and beat into one cup of mayonnaise.
