Jane Cowl loveliest and most distinguished of American actresses, opens her engagement at the Cass Theatre, Detroit on Monday night. She will appear in a new play of modern life entitled "Jenny" written by Margaret Avery Barnes and Edward Sheldon.

"Jenny," which had its preliminary presentation in Boston last Spring and is seen in Detroit but a few weeks in advance of the New York opening, is already listed among Miss Cowl's successes. And Miss Cowl, it will be remembered, has given theatregoers such unforgettable evenings in the theatre as "Within the Law," "Lilac Time," "Smilin' Through," and "Romeo and Juliet."

From its chic frocks to the frank darning of its love story, "Jenny" is thoroughly modern. It presents an absorbing study of smart-set American life as seen in an extravaganza Westchester household whose members seem to have little in common but their love for costly excitement. Mother, daughter and son are equally irresponsible in their disregard of each other and in their neglect of the head of the family whom they look upon as a duty-bound checkbook.

The charm of her own vivid personality is enhanced by her sure appreciation of the character of the man she loves, and by her courage in combatting the conventions which fetter his happiness. Though comedy is the keynote of "Jenny," there are scenes of tense drama and a swift unexpected climax.
