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## GOOD FRIDAY UNION SERVICE AT M. E. CHURCH

Three Ministers Will Give  
Lenten Sermons  
Apr. 18

FOR NEAR EAST RELIEF

The union Good Friday service under the auspices of the Birmingham Minister's Association, will be held Friday, Apr. 18 at the First Methodist Episcopal church from 1:30 to 3:30 p. m.

Sermons will be delivered by the Rev. Henry S. Evans, of the United Presbyterian Church, the Rev. Robert M. Atkins, of the Methodist Episcopal Church and

the Rev. David Leon Woodward, of the First Baptist Church. The Rev. Evans will speak first on "Jesus in Gethsemane," the Rev. Atkins will speak on "Jesus on Trial" and the Rev. Woodward will speak on "Jesus On The Cross."

Preceding each sermon there will be singing of hymns, special musical presentations and prayer. The music will be in charge of Frederick A. Protheroe, director of music at the Baptist Church and Eddie Edwards, organist-director of the Methodist Church. Stanley Rosso of the First Baptist Church also will assist in the service. The choral music will be presented by the First Baptist and Methodist church choirs. The Good Friday offering will go to the Near East Relief fund and for the starving in China.

## SIX ARE FIRED BY JUSTICES

Drunk Drivers, Disorderly  
Persons, Are Arrested  
Over Week-end

Fines for driving while drunk or being disorderly persons were meted out to six offenders over the week-end by Justices Floyd S. Buck and Malcolm Hunt.

Alex Falkenau of Flint, Mich., pleaded guilty Monday when arraigned before Justice Buck on a charge of being disorderly when he was arrested Saturday by Sgt. Delos Anderson of the Bloomfield Hills Police Department. Sgt. Anderson told the court he arrested Falkenau when he noticed him driving on the wrong side of the road. Falkenau was driving under the influence of liquor, he said.

Judge Buck ordered Falkenau to pay a fine of \$75 or spend 45 days in jail.

George Yablonsky, 13492 Cherry street, Detroit, was arrested Sunday for driving while drunk in the village. Arraigned the next morning before Justice Hunt, he was fined \$50 in the court of spending 30 days in jail.

Joseph Costy, of Pontiac, paid a fine of \$50 in the court of Justice Buck Saturday morning. He was arrested in Bloomfield Hills for speeding and disorderly conduct, and when arraigned, was given his choice of the fine or 30 days in the Oakland County jail.

C. J. Hartwick, 7310 Woodward avenue, Detroit, found guilty of being disorderly paid a \$25 fine Monday when arraigned before Judge Buck.

Joe Levandoski, of Quanton road, arrested for drunkenness in the village Sunday, was arraigned Monday morning in the court of Justice Hunt. He pleaded guilty, and paid a fine of \$15, in preference to spending 10 days in the Oakland County jail.

W. J. Craig, 5467 Crane avenue, Detroit, arrested Saturday by Patrolman Delyle Service, for speeding in Woodward avenue, paid \$10 for the offense when he was arraigned Monday before Judge Buck.

## Youths Steal Police Car Tires— Joke's On Them

Howard West, of Milford, and Irwin Kirkland, of Detroit, did not intend to play an April Fool's joke Apr. 1, when they removed two wheels and tires from a car parked in front of a school house near Keego Harbor. As a matter of fact, they were very serious about it, and meant to profit in a pecuniary way from the act.

As it turned out, however, it was a joke—on them; for the pilfered automobile happened to be the Bloomfield Hills police car, being used at the time by Sgt. Delos Anderson, who, at the moment, was attending a meeting in the school house.

Anderson came out and found the car resting on its rear axle, it is probable that many and varied thoughts entered his brain. It is even possible that certain vigorous words formed on his lips.

Sgt. Anderson, however, always gets his man, even if he has to chase him to Flint, as we related once before in these columns. How long have you been in this type of business?

Twenty years.

What led you to choose Birmingham as your location?

I was looking for educational advantages for my children. Michigan universities and schools have a high rating. I made a visit here last August, and the beautiful homes, fine school, the refined class of people I met convinced me this was the ideal place to rear my family and practice my profession.

Do you wish to keep the village of a residential nature?

If Birmingham had a medical building that would house all its physicians and dentists equipped with X-ray and laboratory and an emergency department to take care of the great number of accidents, this would avoid much duplication of equipment and give the public much better service.

## DENIED NEW TRIAL, SACHSE TO APPEAL

His Counsel To Ask Supreme  
Court To Release Him  
On Bail

An appeal to the Michigan Supreme Court in an effort to have Otto Sachse, Pontiac millionaire, released on bond and granted a new trial was being prepared today by his counsel, Carl H. Felton and Clinton McGee, following the opinion handed down last Thursday by Judge Glenn C. Gillespie in the Oakland Circuit Court, who denied Sachse a new trial.

Sachse, 59 years old, is under a sentence of from 5 to 10 years in the Michigan State Prison at Jackson for embezzling \$15,500 from the Pontiac School Board while he was its president in 1928. He was convicted Mar. 19.

The motion for a new trial for Sachse was filed without argument and Judge Gillespie, in his written statement, stated that he found the questions of errors raised by Sachse's counsel were without justifiable foundation.

## Bloomfield Plans Grading Project

Grading of the intersection of the Long Lake, Vaughan and Bard roads in Bloomfield will be begun by the village as soon as weather permits, Harry Starr, village engineer, has announced. The resolution authorizing the grading, to assist the county road commission, was announced by the commission. Mr. Starr says that part of the expense of the work will be borne by the county.
