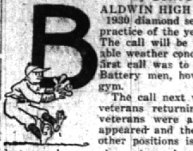

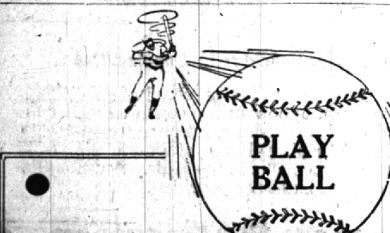
## ADAMS STUDENTS ADOPT NEW CODE
