

## Col. Edwin S. George Donates Forest Preserve To U. of M.

Acceptance of a 1,250 acre tract of land in Livingston County by the University of Michigan to be used for the furtherance of the study of wild life by students of the university, of the Cranbrook Foundation, and other groups interested in nature study, was made Friday by university officials, following the donation of the tract by Col. Edwin S. George, of Bloomfield Hills. Col. George last winter donated a 600-acre tract of land to the Boy Scouts in Birmingham for an all-year camp and lodge which has been named "Camp George" in his honor.

The tract is in a rolling country 20 miles northwest of Ann Arbor and three miles west of Pinckney on M-49 between South Lyons and Pinckney. Most of the wild life on the property has been preserved. In addition, the forests are stocked with native Michigan birds and animals. Deer from the Upper Peninsula and a herd of antelope from Alberta, Can., also have been set free in the territory. Although half of the property is wooded, plans have been made to reforest the remainder of it.

Eighteen miles of roads have been laid out on the tract and a Colonial home, a gatekeeper's lodge, two residences, stables and a garage, all built within the last two years, are located on the property. A landing field for airplanes has also been laid out.

A two-fold object prompted him to make the donation, Col. George said.

Jack Lehman, five-year-old son of Patrolman Stuart Lehman of the Royal Oak police department, died Monday from head injuries sustained when he was run over by an automobile driven by his father at 7 p.m. yesterday.

Lehman and his family were visiting his sister-in-law in Detroit yesterday and Jack was playing with a group of children in the yard when he was run over as his father backed his automobile out of the drive.

The sister-in-law, who has been ill with blood poisoning, is also reported to be in a serious condition from shock following the accident.
