

GIRL IS KILLED IN AUTO CRASH

Waitress At Barbecue Is
Thrown From Car In
Accident Monday

Miss Elizabeth Disney, 18 years old, 1025 Elwood street, Royal Oak, was fatally injured Monday night when the automobile in which she was riding was struck by another machine driven by E. M. Castaneda, 20 years Wilson avenue, Pontiac, at Woodward avenue and the Harvard road.

Witnesses say that the accident occurred when Miss Dorothy Henry, 27, a roommate of the dead girl, attempted to make a left turn into south-bound traffic at the intersection. Miss Henry stopped her new coupe and then, apparently not seeing Castaneda's machine, started across the street. Her car was buried several yards. Miss Disney, thrown from the machine by the force of the collision, suffered a fractured skull and died while being taken to the Margrave Hospital. Miss Disney was employed as a waitress at a barbecue lunch room near where the accident happened.

The proceeds from this sale will be used towards the pledge of the Birmingham Council to help pay for the Oakland County Girl Scout camp. The camp is located on Davis Lake, four and a half miles from Lapeer, the site including about 54 acres of hilly and wooded shore land. Heretofore, Birmingham Girl Scouts have been cared for in various camps, but with the purchase of this site the girls are provided with a permanent camp home, open to all Girl Scouts in Oakland County. Last year fully a quarter of the girls in attendance at Camp Davis came from Birmingham, and according to all indications we will have even a greater number this year. For the first time Royal Oak girls will attend the camp as Royal Oak is now under its own Council and joining with Pontiac and Birmingham in a camp program.
