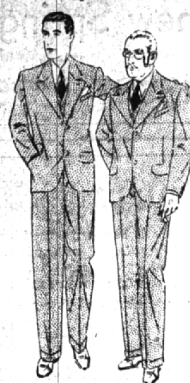

INDIAN SINGER PLEASES MANY

Tsianina Recital Given Before Capacity Audience At Community House

Tsianina, Indian mezzo soprano singing a program composed principally of the melodies of her race, Friday entertained a capacity audience at the feature event of the Thursday Musicals' 1929-30 program in the new Community House. The response to her delightful program was enthusiastic and prolonged.

While music of the Indian largely composed her program, revealing the characteristic feelings and classic restraint of her race, Tsianina's program also included a group of compositions in English. She commenced her recital with the religious ceremonial "Sunrise Call" by T. Royer. It was sung in the Zuni Indian tongue. Another particularly interesting composition was a melancholy composition by a friend of the artist. It was "The Indian Mother's Lament." Tsianina's accompaniment was played by Gail Fairchild Bangs.

Evergreen Tree, a Pueblo Indian, also contributed to the success of the affair with his remarkable imitations of bird calls. With an expressed imagination that would do credit to a Latin tenor, he brought his hearers on a walk through woods, over waterland and mountains, giving realistic imitations of animals and birds that might be seen or heard on the way.

Both Tsianina and Evergreen Tree were in native costume. For her encores, Tsianina played her own piano accompaniment, while Evergreen Tree in his dancing numbers, beat a primitive rhythm on an Indian drum.
