## STEAM LAUNDRY OPENS ON MONDAY

Latest Business Addition Will Feature Modern Sorting System

The White Line Laundry, Birmingham's latest business addition, will be opened in its new quarters at 540 Pierce street, just south of Brown street next Monday. The new laundry is the only

steam laundry in Birmingham and will be operated by Mr. Allan Murray and Mr. Albert Moser. Mr. Murray for the past seven years has been engaged in the laundry business in Detroit and Mr. Moser is a resident of the city in the United States Army and the youngest pilot to receive his commission from Kelly Field, Texas. Mr. Moser is treasurer of the firm.

Provision for all kinds of family laundering are established in the new headquarters and a modern system of sorting individual packages to avoid any shortage or mixing of laundry will be featured, Mr. Murray says.

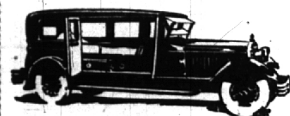
