

RADIO STARS ON AIR APR. 7

Operatic Leaders On Program At Opening Of NBC Series

An all-star radio presentation lasting for an hour and featuring the brightest stars in the broadcast medium has been arranged by the National Broadcasting Company to be given in its Times Square Studio Monday night, Apr. 7.

The broadcast, beginning at 10:30 p. m. (Eastern Standard Time), is the first in a series of three similar events to be staged by the NBC on successive Monday nights.

A coast-to-coast network of stations associated with the NBC will receive the program, which will be presented in two sections, each section lasting half an hour.

In contrast to past radio programs, however, the new studio forthcoming program, entitled "The NBC Times Square Studio Concert," will consist of a series of six acts, each act lasting half an hour. This feature makes the broadcast a part of the actual broadcast.

Two announcers, Graham McNamee and Phillips Carlin, and three noted radio musical directors and a concert orchestra, will supplement the array of individual broadcast talent to be heard in the event. Mr. H. Aylsworth, president of the National Broadcasting Company, will deliver an address of welcome from behind the huge curtain during the ten minutes immediately preceding the start of the broadcast.

The first half of the concert, which will be announced by McNamee, will consist of selections by such well known artists as Renald Werrenath, baritone; Desolina Gianni, soprano; the Symphonic Choir; Renee Chast, violinist; Josef Levine, pianist; and Victor Chelika, baritone. Cesare Sadori, maestro of the National Grand Opera Company, will direct the orchestra.

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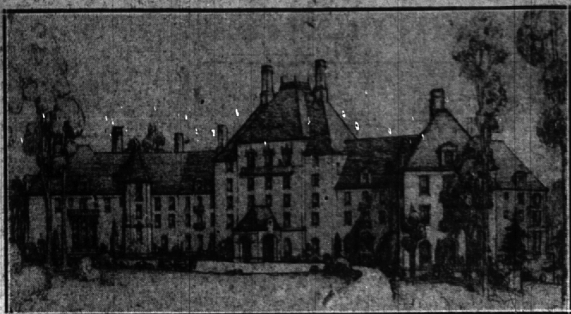
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Christian Science Sanatorium in California



SAN FRANCISCO: Under articles of incorporation already filed with the Secretary of State of California, permanent trustees took over the ownership of the property and buildings which are to accommodate the Christian Science Benevolent Association for Pacific Coast. The Association, which will open its doors to guests about the middle of May, was established in accordance with Section 8 of Article 10 of the Charter of the City of San Francisco.

The Benevolent Association for Pacific Coast is the third large charitable institution established by the Mother Church, totaling an investment of over \$4,000,000. The Christian Science Benevolent Association, located in Chastnut Hill, Mass., was chartered in 1914, and The Christian Science Pleasant View Home, located in Concord, N. H., in 1925.

While all three of these corporations are independent from a legal point of view they are under the control and supervision of The Christian Science Board of Directors.

The California property, known as Arden Wood, is a thickly timbered, 14 acre, piece of rolling land situated on the edge of San Francisco, its general location being between Twin Peaks and the Ocean. The sanatorium is sheltered from the prevailing winds by the hill which forms the principal topographical feature of the property. No public roads or ways cross it, but paths will be arranged extending from the Sanatorium through the woods, making a feature of a small ravine which runs along the east boundary.

The Sanatorium, designed by Henry H. Guttersen, Architect, is of steel and reinforced concrete done in a modernized Bryton style with high central pavilion, tall classic French windows and arched, red tiled roof. It will contain accommodations for 150 guests and associates.

Within the last few weeks a substantial piece of property falling into the principal tract, formerly held by the City of San Francisco for school purposes, has been purchased to secure additional quiet and freedom from outside disturbances. The Board of Trustees of the Christian Science Board of Directors is the Board of the two new English institutions.

The three Trustees of the new corporation are Mrs. Gertrude M. Glas, George D. Greenwood, and Marvin R. Higgins. William D. Clark has been appointed Manager-Treasurer. All of these officers have been actively interested in Christian Science work for many years.
