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Wanderlust Boys
Recite Experience
Of 'World Tour'
Desire For Adventure Over-
come By Hunger And
Losing For Home

(Confession) "distasteful world travelers as told to Gordon Greene for The Birmingham Eccentric."
Birmingham's two wanderlust boys, Hugh McHugh and Stanley Burk, who last week started a four year tour of the world that ended shortly after the eleventh hour away from home, have spent the first week after their brief adventure at home. They probably will remain there for some time before attempting another trip, judging from the statements made by each of the boys.

A desire to see the world, to serve in the French Foreign Legion, to stow away on ocean-going ships, and to know other excitements of long years of travel led the pair to make plans two weeks before the four-year tour actually started only as far as the next city, Royal Oak, Wednesday afternoon, following a scout and six cents, Stan and Hughie set out through a nearby woods toward the village of Clawson.

The first lap of the journey brought the boys to a deserted farm where they made camp. The two boys had left notes of farewell, and had taken their own measure, a sack of flour, some tinned goods, and a few dollars. Some time was required to formulate plans of travel in the future, but this was decided to rest before continuing along the highways. It was decided that the longest lap to try would be made at night and that the general direction of the trek would be toward New Orleans where it would be easy, the thought, to stowaway on one of the large passenger liners resting in the harbor.

Africa was to be the destination if the two did not board the ship. Traveling to New York was to be luxurious, each spending money for pop and sodas and other luxuries. They might visit the whole hemisphere and when they were 18 years old, they would return to their respective families, they decided, and see how everything was getting on. Nothing had been left in the notes but the boys would "write" often, but that they did expect letters in return, because they were continuing on to the next town.

At last they bade farewell to their Birmingham friends and started the trip, proceeding to second airport at the intersection of East and Second streets. After spending some time there, the wanderers set out for Clawson and by hitch-hiking, finally reached Clawson at dinner time. Both were tired, dusty, sick and weary from the heat, and ravenously hungry. Because of their condition, they were unable to do their regular meals more than anything. During the trip, they had one last look at Birmingham, to see how the city of their hearts appeared at night. Hughie consented to return with Stan within a reasonable distance of the village home. Because of their weary hearts, belated supper, and sleepiness, fascinations of the Foreign Legion and Africa were forgotten, and the two looked with disgust at the maps over which they had rapturously poured for the past two weeks. They were disappointed, and the Foreign Legion didn't need them anyway.

Unless they have changed their residence in the township, Bloomfield township voters who cast their ballots in the 1928 presidential election need not re-register. James V. Bailey, township clerk, announced.
