

# CLAWSON SET FOR JUBILEE

### Village To Celebrate Fifteenth Anniversary Next Saturday

Clawson will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of its village post office and the naming of the territory surrounding Fourteen Mile road and Main street, Saturday. Former employees of the post office will work in the office dressed in clothes worn three years ago, and an oxen team will be used to draw a load of mail, commemorating the manner in which the first mail was delivered there.

Thomas F. DeClaire, president of the village, was chosen to head a committee of 13 prominent citizens at a meeting in the Village office recently, and an appropriation of \$100 for the celebration was authorized by the village commission.

The festivities will commence at one in the afternoon and end in the early morning, with a parade, street dancing, games, contests, and talks from well known speakers.

Pleading guilty to a charge of unlawfully driving away an automobile, Cecil Mitchell, age 21, 123 Jefferson avenue, Clawson, was bound over to Oakland county circuit court by Justice Collier at Pontiac Friday. He is held in the county jail in default of \$500 bond. Mitchell waived examination.

Information about possible sites for the new Royal Oak postoffice has been sought by postoffice inspectors during the last few days. A study of local conditions has been made and a number of persons interviewed.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon for Robert W. Wychoff, 83 years old, of Holly, who died Thursday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Harriet Teek. Mr. Wychoff was a Civil War Veteran, and a member of the 24th Michigan Infantry. He had the distinction of being one of the guards who watched over Lincoln's body, lying in state at Springfield.

Burial was in Lakeside cemetery, the Rev. S. A. Burnett, of the Baptist church officiating. The American Legion firing squad fired a salute over his grave, and taps were sounded at the conclusion of the ceremony.

Mr. Wychoff was born in Rose township, and lived in Oakland county all his life. He is survived by Mrs. Teek, a son, John; three brothers, Myron, of Hartland, and Emory, of Milford; and a sister, Miss Sarah, of White Lake.

Final arrangements were made at a special meeting of the Rochester American Legion Thursday evening for the Legion carnival, which will be held today, Friday and Saturday and promises to be one of the largest of its kind ever held by the Legion.

Mr. Elias Martin, 98 years old, a resident of Metamora, was buried Saturday afternoon in Metamora cemetery, after funeral services at the home of her son, Bonedette Martin, with whom she had resided.

Mrs. Martin, whose maiden name was Anna Maria Fishell, was born in 1832 in Rush, N. Y. She married Elias Martin in 1853 and they came to Michigan in 1878, living for a year in Thornville. They then moved to a farm a mile east of this village, where Mr. Martin died 19 years ago.

John Simeat, age 44, 1888 East Nine-Mile road, Ferndale, charged with attempted murder, following the shooting of his wife, Anna, and her son by a former marriage, Joseph Burkhardt, Wednesday night, pleaded not guilty Friday morning at arraignment before Justice Fred E. Gordon. Simeat was held in the Ferndale city jail for examination before Justice Gordon today.

Mrs. Simeat, age 48, who was shot through the right breast and right arm, is still in a critical condition in the Highland Park hospital. The bullet through her breast punctured her lung. Her son, age 22, is recovering from bullet wounds in his right leg, right arm and chest. Simeat gave himself up to deputy sheriffs after the shooting.

Active water services in Royal Oak city during June and July continued to show a steady increase, with 154 new services on the water department's books. O. Collins, water clerk, reports. Twenty new taps were installed in each of the two months.

Manager L. P. Cookingham said Monday that there would be no water shortage in Clawson this summer for the first time in the village's history. On July 21 the record amount of 251,000 gallons of water was pumped for the village's consumption.

Although Farmington's supply of water shows no evidence of a shortage, residents are asked to conserve water in order to relieve the strain on the city's pumping apparatus, which has been operating twice the average number of hours each day.

Careless smokers are warned by Chief Roy Ottmar, of the Keego Harbor fire department, to use caution in disposing of cigar and cigarette stubs, especially because of the long drought and resulting dryness. There were five grass fires and one straw stack blaze in one day last week.
