STATE PLANS SURVEY FOR PARK SITES IN METROPOLITAN AREAS

LANSING, Aug. 14.—A series of state parks with their shady wooded acres, their long lines of bathing beaches and all of their other facilities for wholesome outdoor recreation—all within easy reach of two millions of Michigan's people is a dream that some day may reach actuality.

A survey of the area forming a 50-mile radius around Detroit has been authorized by the Conservation Commission at the request of P. J. Hoffmaster, head of the Division of Parks. This survey will inquire into every possible park site and through its findings, promising sites will be seriously considered with a view to development.

The object of the entire proceedings will be to provide an avenue for economical recreation to the thousands of the state's center of population, people whose work and finances do not permit long distances and who most need this recreation.

While the state now has 65 parks, only a few of them are located in the southeastern section of the state. The parks in Oakland, Livingston, Macomb and St. Clair Counties, which have been opened up to the public are already overcrowded. The total area of the parks in this vicinity approximately 1,500 acres. Mr. Hoffmaster believes that the state should have no less than 10,000 acres within a radius of 50 miles of Detroit. Such an acreage would be made up of a number of sites which would provide an outlet not only for Detroit but for Lansing, Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor, Jackson, Okemos, Flint, Saginaw, and a score of smaller municipalities in this general location.

More than 20,000 people attended the Oakland County Fair at Millford in celebration of its Golden Jubilee, from Thursday through to Saturday. Exhibits at the 1930 Golden Jubilee Fair were as good, if not better, than any we have had at former fairs, said Mr. W. S. Lovejoy. "We had to turn away several applicants for exhibits in the cattle and sheep divisions due to lack of room. I believe that in every branch, except automobiles, the Oakland County Fair was a complete success."
