Uncle Sam's Wife Says:

After an apple pie is baked, lay thin slices of cheese over the top, and put in a very moderate oven until the cheese is melted. Serve at once while the cheese is warm.

A thick steak after searing may be successfully finished in a hot oven (540° F.). Slip a rack under the steak in the skillet, and the meat will cook evenly without being turned.

Be careful not to cook corn on the cob too long or it will be tough and tasteless. Have a large kettle of water boiling rapidly and drop the corn into the water for from 8 to 10 minutes, if there are not many ears.

To shorten a pattern for a small person, fold a tuck in it half-way between the armhole and the waist-line, and another tuck half-way between the waistline and the bottom. In cutting, straighten the seam lines as necessary. If a shorter sleeve is required, cut the elbow and wrist, so that the elbow always remains in the correct position. Such alterations should be carefully fitted to the person before the material is cut.

The kitchen of even a rented house may be made convenient. It will pay you to study the arrangement of the major equipment with reference to your work centers for preparing raw food, cooking, broiling, clearing away, and dishwashing. Sometimes slight changes in position of equipment make a big difference in comfort. Paint the walls a cheerful color, such as warm tan or soft yellow—or cool gray in a room that receives plenty of sunshine. Provide extra shelves and storage places if necessary, and have places to keep each set of utensils where they are needed.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

MENU HINT French Fried Potatoes

Chocolate Lemon Cake Tea
A good cake is a fine finish to a good meal. And one satisfactory thing about cake as a dessert is that it may be made early in the day, frosted and all, and is all ready to serve whether the family or guests are early or late for dinner.

Today's Recipes
Chocolate Lemon Cake—One-half cup butter, two cups brown sugar, two eggs, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one-half cup sour milk, one-half cup boiling water, one teaspoon soda, one-half cup cocoa, two and one-fourth cups flour, one teaspoon vanilla, one teaspoon baking powder. Cream the shortening and add one cup of sugar gradually. Beat the eggs until they are light and add the other cup of sugar to them. Mix the two combinations and beat thoroughly. Sift the flour, salt, soda and baking powder several times and add to the first combination alternately with the sour milk. Beat well. Stir the cocoa smooth in the boiling water and

add. Put in the vanilla last. Pour into three layer cake pans, smoothing the batter with the back of a spoon. This is a very thick dough, and care must be taken that it lies evenly in the pans before they are put into the oven. Bake 25 minutes in a moderate oven. Make the filling as follows: Bring a cup of water to the boiling point and then stir into it a previously mixed blend of one cup of sugar, three level tablespoons cornstarch, one tablespoon butter, a quarter of a teaspoon salt and one-half cup of cold water. Let the mixture cook, stirring constantly, until it begins to thicken (about 12 minutes). Beat up the yolks of two eggs and stir them into the filling. Finally add the juice of one lemon or about four tablespoons of lemon juice and the grated rind of a medium-sized lemon. Spread between the layers and let cool.

Suggestions
Heavy Oil Stains
Heavy, black grease or oil spots from the car or road frequently find their way to the front of a favorite summer dress. Sponging the spot with a grease solvent will

remove these stains from unwashable materials if the above precautions of sponging are followed. The grease solvent may also be used on the unwashable material. If it seems a particularly stubborn stain the application of turpentine before applying the cleaning fluid is effective.

There are two general types of oils used in cars, Pennsylvania which is green and has a paraffin base, western which is red with an asphaltum base. The former may be removed by sponging the stain with article with a grease solvent while the latter requires the application of lard before washing.

When applying lard to a stain, rub it into the material well. As soon as it becomes discolored, remove this and apply more.

Lard is also used in removing tea stains. If the material is washable, wash it after the application of lard. If not, remove the clean grease stain with a grease solvent.

Trays
If you do not know the convenience of having several trays about the house, invest in some. For carrying food and china and silver from kitchen or pantry to the table, when clearing off the soiled dishes, when serving local beverages out on the porch, for their will save many extra footsteps.
