

GOV. ASKS AID IN FIGHTING FOREST FIRES

Damage So Far Exceeds Loss Suffered in 1929, Report Shows

PLEA IS BROADCAST

LANSING, Aug. 21.—With the forest fire damage this season already in excess of that for the entire 1929 period and with dry weather rapidly accumulating more hazards, Gov. Fred W. Green made a personal appeal to all Michigan radio stations for assistance in broadcasting warnings to tourists and residents.

"Untold thousands of dollars in property and scenic values in Michigan are threatened by the present extreme forest fire hazard period," Governor Green's appeal said. "Dry fields, woods, and forests are ready to burst into flame. Every resident and visitor has a responsibility to use the greatest possible caution in preventing the spread of fire. Every camp fire, every match, every piece of burning tobacco, are possible destroyers. You cannot be too careful. A fire once started can not be reported too soon. Call central, she knows."

Further pleas to Michigan newspapers and to the four tourist and resort bureaus of the state for help in bringing the appeal for caution in the forest fire zones to everyone, were made by Director George R. Hogarth of the Department of Conservation.

"The entire organized forest fire fighting force of the state is at work day and night, fighting fires and watching for possible new ones," Director Hogarth said. "However, the more the cooperation of the public is ably assisted necessary if we are going to resist an appalling loss."

The Forest Fire Division of the Department of Conservation estimates that close to 55,000 acres have been burned over so far this year. The total burned over acreage for the entire 1929 season was 45,000.
