**3,000 ELM TREES GIVEN TREATMENT**

Preparations for the future beautification of Birmingham through the planting of additional elm trees were indicated Monday night in the discussion of the bill for the grafting of approximately 3,000 of the trees by a group of men trained in tree surgery.

Upon the request of Commissioner Lawrence Hulbert, 3,000 American elm saplings, purchased at a cost of approximately three cents each, has been grafted during the early part of July with what is known as Moline elm buds. The Moline elm is a much faster growing tree and the work was necessarily contingent with the growth of the saplings. The bill for the work on the 3,000 saplings, was \$164.45.
