**CHEESE DREAMS**  
Three eggs beaten, three tablespoons chili sauce, three tablespoons cream, one tablespoon finely minced onion, three heads of the bread, spreading it with a soft cheese. Dip each sandwich into the egg mixture and brown in hot butter, first one side, then the other. Garnish with sprigs of parsley and serve stuffed olives and dill pickles with it.

This menu is one of those that are equally appetizing at lunch or dinner at night. Plenty of fruits and vegetables and little meat should be the rule in every household during the hot weather.

**Today's Recipes**  
**Stuffed Tomatoes**—Six firm tomatoes, one-half package soft cheese, one-half cup chopped celery, one-half cup chopped stuffed olives, one tablespoon chopped green pepper, one-fourth to one-half cup mayonnaise. Hollow out tomatoes, turn upside down to drain, chill. Cut cheese in tiny cubes and mix with the other ingredients, including the tomato pulp. Use enough mayonnaise to flavor well. Pack the tomatoes with the cheese mixture and chill in refrigerator, or if you have an electric refrigerator, freeze for one hour in the refrigerator tray. Serve on shredded lettuce with more salad dressing if desired.

**Frozen Custard**—Four cups milk, two eggs, one-half cup sugar, one teaspoon salt, two cups light cream, one-half tablespoon vanilla. Scald milk. Beat eggs with sugar and salt. Pour small amount of the scalded milk into this, stirring constantly. All soon it is well mixed, turn it back into double boiler and cook, stirring constantly until the cus-

**Fruit Punch for Fifty**  
Four teaspoons tea, two quarts boiling water, two cups sugar, two cups orange juice, one cup lemon juice, one quart sparkling cherry beverage, two quarts sparkling water. Pour the boiling water over the tea and let stand three minutes. Strain, add sugar, and cool. Add fruit juices and sparkling beverage. Place a block of ice in punch bowl and pour the punch over it, or serve in glasses with cracked ice.
