Mr. T. R. Donovan entertained at dinner and their practice last evening at the Bloomfield Hunt Club.

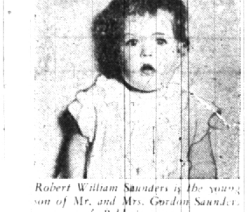
