

### HUNTING TOLL DEATHS NOW 27

Thirty-five Injured in Woods Accidents, State Dept. Report Shows

LANSING, Dec. 18.—Twenty-seven families have occurred in Michigan from hunting accidents since the deer season opened Sept. 16.

The State Department of Conservation, issuing a report today of hunting accidents, indicated that practically the same number of persons have been killed or injured this year as during the 1929 hunting season.

To date, the 1930 casualties are: 27 killed; 35 injured. The figures for the same period during 1929 were: 26 killed; 38 injured.

While the number of hunters killed during the deer season was two less this year than last year, the number of persons injured dropped almost 50 percent. During the 1929, 15 deer hunters were killed and 23 were injured. The best available reports for the 1930 deer season show that killed and injured were 13 and 22, respectively.

From Sept. 16 to the opening of the deer hunting season, small game hunting this year directly or indirectly caused the deaths of 18 persons and injuries to 22. During the same period in 1929 the toll of persons was 15 and 15 were injured.

While the Department of Conservation does not claim that its accident report figures are absolutely accurate, it is believed that they represent the correct figures as nearly as possible. All conservation officers filed reports of all hunting accidents occurring in their patrolled territories.
