BOWER, WILCOX AGREE
An ordinance agreeable both to the city of proposed contract Bower for the construction of an elevated motor highway from Detroit to the city of Pontiac, Michigan over the right-of-way of the Grand Trunk Railway, is expected to be passed next Monday at the regular meeting of the Detroit City Council.

12-Ride Commuter Ticket Plan Approved By Transit Committee GETS 30-DAY TRIAL

Effective Mar. 1, a new schedule of reduced fares through the use of 12-ride commuter tickets interchangeable on buses and interurbans will go into effect on the Eastern Michigan Lines between Detroit and Pontiac with a 26-cent fare between Detroit and Birmingham. The new schedule, which will be given a 30-day trial, is a compromise between two proposals previously brought by the E. M. R. and the Inter-Municipal Transportation Committee, and was approved at a meeting held at Northwood Inn.

At the end of the 30-day trial period the rates will be set at the operating cost and a reasonable return on the investment is not realized. The company can change the rates on a 10-day notice, it was agreed. If the change is effected, the company will return the tickets at their face value. The new system of fares now in use between Detroit and Pontiac.

Will Get 30-Day Trial
E. M. Maddox, superintendent of the bus lines, in discussing the new system of fares, said that the plan provides for a fare slightly higher than the fare proposed by the E. M. R. and the Inter-Municipal Transportation Committee, but less than the fare proposed by the latter. The rates will be set during that time and after, our books will be open for your inspection and the trip tickets will be available so that you can weigh the returns and the number of passengers carried to judge the success of the plan.

Tillotson Enters Commission Race; M. Lyle Withdraws

Little Campaigning Done For Election March 10; Coryell Succeeds Allen; Ellerby Still Undecided Whether He Will Qualify

With the entrance of Mr. Edwin H. Tillotson as a candidate for Village Commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Harry Allen, who is a candidate for Village President, and the withdrawal of Norman Lyle as a candidate for commissioner for the two-year term, Birmingham's election situation is slightly changed.

17 CANDIDATES ARE ON BALLOT IN SOUTHFIELD

Southfield Township, with 17 candidates filed and qualified for supervisor, clerk, treasurer, highway commissioner, justice of the peace (full term) and justice of the peace (fill vacancy), members of the board of regents and two constables, is expected to experience an interesting primary election Mar. 3.

Mr. Tillotson, the latest candidate, has been qualified for the short term just as Mr. Lyle did not. Mr. Ellerby says, "I'm waiting a while before I take any definite action on the election."
