BALDWIN JUNIORS BOW TO FERDALE

Baldwin Junior High School's cagers lost their first contest since the Adams game when they were nosed out, 10 to 9 on Friday by the Lincoln Junior quintet of Ferndale.

The aggressiveness which has marked most of the contests in which the Baldwin Juniors have engaged this season was lacking in the contest and only three of their foul shots were scored in the first half. Ferndale's cagers scored two baskets from behind the double line.

In the second half both teams battled evenly, each scoring six points. McBride popped two long shots and Aldrich a short one for Birmingham, while LaPrete, Granger and Pelton scored for the Lincoln cagers.
Only two games remain on the Baldwin Junior schedule, one with Taft of Ferndale at Birmingham tomorrow, and one with the Acorn Juniors at Royal Oak.

BALDWIN QUINTET LOSES TO ACORNS

In a fast game which evidenced how well-matched were both teams, Baldwin High School's basketball quintet Tuesday succumbed to a final period rally by the Royal Oak cagers and lost, 18 to 18. The victory for Royal Oak was the second of the season over the local boys and was almost a repetition of the contest last month in which the visitors came from behind to win.

Potter and King who each scored six points in the second half of the fray were largely responsible for the Royal Oak victory. Their excellent work, however, was outshone by Schwarz who gathered four field goals and a free throw for nine points.
Baldwin's battlers held a four point lead until the final stanza. Schwarz's lone marker in the last few minutes helped out Woodward of the Acorns scored another to gain the final two-point advantage the visitors held when the game ended.

The game was still young when Schwarz received a pass from Chandler, and standing unguarded beneath the basket, tossed one neatly through. Judson of Royal Oak, however, quickly added one from close defensive territory.
The second quarter saw Dalley and Dixon in the forward positions. Dalley raised the count to 5-3 on a gift shot and Dixon added another. On a jump ball near his own basket Potter received the sphere and scored neatly. On the tip-off Cook fouled Schwarz who sank the free throw and followed up with a tally from the field. Dixon piled on two more from the foul line to end the half, 11 to 9 in favor of the local cagers.
