

BARNUM SCHOOL ADDITION WORK WILL BE COMPLETED BY SPRING

The work of interior finish in the Barnum school addition is now proceeding at a rapid rate and will be completed in the Spring, ready for occupancy in the fall term, beginning in September.

Approximately 600 children will be accommodated in the new building next year, Clarence M. Vliet, superintendent of schools, believes. The school is now constructed, however, that 800 can be taken care of without overcrowding, and provision is thus made for the normal growth of the village.

The school board is at present working on the question of assigning children and teachers to the school. All the students and teachers from the Hill school will be transferred, and the old building will be devoted temporarily to band practice and other such uses.

WE HEARD IT SAID BY—

Mr. A. C. McGraw: The raise in street car and bus fares in Detroit was justified because nearly everyone who rides in the cars regularly has a job and therefore can afford the two cent increase. The fares had not been raised in about eight years, and the rising scale of wages and cost of overhead made the increase necessary.

Some cases from classrooms by glass partitions, and a library, 34 by 22 feet, separated by a glass partition from the principal's office, will be the scene of scholastic endeavors next year.

A swimming pool, 25 by 79 feet, will be open to the public at certain hours and will have many features planned for convenience and sanitation. The depths of the pool will vary from four to eight feet. On the side toward the hall, there will be bleachers for observers, who will be barred from the other three sides by a railing. The swimmers must enter through the locker rooms, the men's and women's being on opposite sides. To reach the water, they must wade through a shallow pool of chlorinated solution. Every six months, the pool will be emptied, and the bottom will be vacuum cleaned. The water is so purified and returned to the pool.

Steel beams on the ceiling of the swimming pool support the auditorium, 65 feet wide, and 88 feet long between the balcony and stage.

Playing fields of standard sizes for various sports will be provided and chairs for auditorium use will be stored under the balcony when not in use. A well equipped music room will be at one end of the auditorium, with dressing rooms at each side. Other features of the building will include a kindergarten, somewhat larger than the classrooms, with a large bay window facing South, and a fire place, a science room, with a green house and an aquarium, a manual training room adjoining a finishing room, a nurse's clinic, an art room, 32 by 22 feet, and a community and band room.

The partitions between the classrooms are of hollow tile, and carry no weight, so that they may be easily removed if it is desired to connect two rooms. The beams supporting the ceilings are of steel and concrete, and lathing is of metal.
