We Are Making Our Own Berets

Only a few years ago we were making our own scarves. That

was in the time of straight lines and the boyish silhouette. Now we are making our own berets in the days of the very feminine silhouette and the more flattering millinery. Paris has decreed, and the world accepts, the soft informal beret crocheted or knitted of fine, long thread cotton yarn, in colors to harmonize with, or match, the ensemble. Some of the smartest ensembles in the fashionable colors of the season have the crocheted or knitted beret, belt and envelope bag to match. A girl who is at all ingenious will experience no difficulty in making herself a set.

Two popular styles in berets that are easy to make are shown at the left of the sketch. That in the upper corner is the snug top model, while that just below is the vagabond type. The belt and the envelope bag are also shown. Either of these berets would go well with the cardigan jacket suit of knit fabric shown at the center, or with a tweed suit, or if one would be prepared for the summer season, why not a knit or crocheted beret for each cotton frock? The cost of making it is but 50 or 75 cents, and the cotton yarn washes like a handkerchief. They are easy to pack in as small a space as a pair of stockings, and most comfortable to wear, but they need to be handmade to be really lovely.

Matching Colors
The beret, with a scarf matching in color or matching the printed silk of the blouse, is very smart with the tailored suit. The cravat scarf, like that shown in the lower right corner of the sketch is the latest. These scarves run between 64 and 72 inches long, so that when they are passed around the neck and knotted, the ends fall below the bust line. Soft silk fashions these scarves so that they can be tied in bows or soft knots. With the tailored suit the cravat knot shown in the sketch is favored. To accommodate itself to either the bow or cravat tie, the scarf must be of the long oblong shape.

And speaking of outdoor clothes, we must not forget the importance of footwear. The shoe worn with sports or street clothes should be as light and comfortable to the feet as the beret is to the head. A shoe especially designed for walking is shown at the lower left of the sketch. It is of a one-strap model, with leather Cuban heel of the correct height for comfort in walking. Being of kid, it is extremely light in construction, yet gives the foot just the needed support that makes walking effortless and graceful. It is the appropriate type of footwear for the sports or tailored suit, similar to those shown in the sketch.

Exercising Beautifies Neck Lines

A neck that is either too fat or too thin adds years to a woman's age. Here is an exercise for building a lovely neck. First of all, sit or stand erect. Put your clenched fist under the chin. Slowly press the chin down as far as it will go, resisting the movement stiffly by an upward thrust with the fist. Now push the chin up and back until the head is extended far back between the shoulders. During this movement, the fat pushes against resistance from the chin. Repeat six times. Second, With the head tilted to the right, push the chin with the left fist obliquely up and back.
