The husband returns from a Western business trip. Her love is gone; she is out of a job. To his suggestion that she now give up her stage career, she accedes reluctantly, relating in detail the wonderful positions she has turned down because of his disapproval.

This scene depicting the fall into a lighted chamber, and a beautiful view of the interior of a gothic basilica where the young man vainly seeks spiritual solace after his first love has proven false, approach the dignity of etchings and are probably the most effective in the novel.

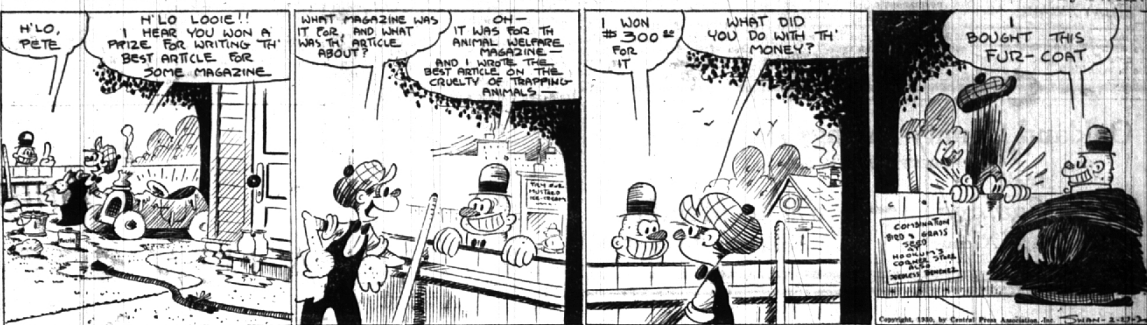

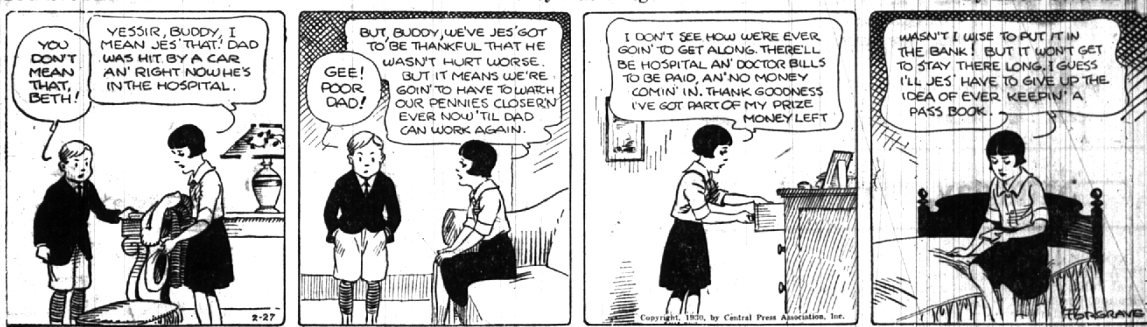
