

NURSE TELLS SIBERIAN WAR EXPERIENCES

Entertains Business and Professional Women's Club At Community House

MISS PLATTE ELECTED

Her war experiences in Siberia was the subject of a talk given by Miss Edna Jarhaus, community nurse in Royal Oak, at the last meeting of the Business and Professional Women's club held Thursday noon in the Community house.

Miss Jarhaus accompanied a division, composed of 30 nurses and 30 doctors and pharmacists, to Siberia, by way of California and China. The principal work of the division was concerned with preventing the spread of Typhus among the soldiers. Interesting sidelights on the manners and customs of the Siberians were given the club members by Miss Jarhaus.

Miss Edna Platte was chosen vice-president of the club to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Miss Doris Groves. Miss Byrdie Kraft, president of the organization, who has been out of town for the past six weeks, is expected to be present at the next meeting, scheduled for this noon.

Officers of the organization included Mrs. Grace Trumbull, and Miss Mary Clark Griffith, of the Community House, and Miss Alice Fox.

OAKLAND COUNTY NEWS

Four miles of pavement laid in the City of Royal Oak in 1929 increased the total mileage of paved streets to 69.5 miles, a report by City Engineer Edward M. Shaffer shows. Fourteen streets, two alleys and the space between the Eastern Michigan interurban tracks on South Washington avenue were paved last year.
