THREE USES FOR BALDWIN BY ONE POINT

Local Cagers Repel Last Minute Attack To Win, 12-11, Friday—

ROYAL OAK NEXT

By repelling a fast attack in the final breath-taking two minutes play, the Baldwin High school team, coached by S. E. A. Leane, defeated the Monroe High Juniors by a one point margin, 12-11, Friday night on the opponents' floor.

The final whistle of the game marked the second consecutive victory for Baldwin by an edge of one point. The victory blurred the winning streak of the team to S. E. A. Leane and stopped their winning streak of three games taken by large margin this season. The Majors have three other wins to their credit and two losses on the list so far this season.

Tomorrow night features a game between Birmingham and traditional rivals from the Royal Oak. It is expected to top the game, being more experienced and having more advantage in weight.

Wedge opened the scoring to win the last of the overtime period when he looped a free toss after both teams had battled furiously for the first part of the game. Birmingham held Monroe scoreless until the middle of the second quarter when they took the count at 5-2. Robinson ended the half with a short shot, 5-4.

Add Four Points
In the third episode Birmingham spread the mesh for four points while the home team gathered up three. The nearest competitor was Hoyt of Monroe who piled up three of the losers 11 points. Schwarz was not up to his usual standard of play for, while he showed well offensively, he lagged offensively.

Wedge was far from his usual good form. Wedge was one of the best defense players on the floor but was slow and clumsy as an offense man. Berger was a main scoring threat for the Maroons but, also below par on offense. Hoyt, Stoner and Robinson played well.
