

SKI TOURNEY AT ROCHESTER

Prominent Skiers, On Program At Bloomer Park, Next Sunday

What will probably be the only major ski tournament of the season in this district will be held at Rochester, Sunday, Jan. 19 at 2:30 p. m.

The meet will be under the auspices of the Detroit Ski Club, a member of the American Ski Association, a group of professional skiers who last year broke away from the Amateur Ski Association. The Detroit tournament is the first annual meet of the new organization.

Many of the country's most renowned skiers will be seen in action at the tournament Sunday, among those are the Haugen brothers and the Hall brothers, members of two famous skiing families. Anders Haugen (Chicago), and Lars Haugen (Minneapolis), have headed America's Olympic ski team, and between them have held the National championship most of the time for the last 10 years. Henry Hall (Detroit) is former world champion, with a leap of 229 feet, and his brothers Carl and Clarence have won trophies for distance and graceful form at every big slide in the country.

These five men are seldom seen together in one meet, and they alone insure unusually brilliant competition. They will be escorted by H. Bjornegard, a skier.

national jumper from Red Wing, Minn., Halvor Walstad, of Racine, Wisconsin, Peter Falsted of Canton, South Dakota, and Casper Oimann of North Dakota, as well as by a score of others.

In preparation for the tournament the scaffold has been raised from 112 to 122 feet, enabling the jumper to gain greater speed before the take-off, and the landing hill has been lengthened. With favorable weather, therefore, the record jump for this hill, 166 feet, should be easily beaten.

For the comfort of spectators seats have been erected beside the landing hill, provided with straw to keep the feet warm, and boys' fires will blaze to the benefit of those standing.

A great quantity of snow has been stored under cover, and officials of the club state that even a complete thaw in the surrounding country will not cause postponement.

I really have the de luxe library of the country.
That local people use their library to advantage was Mrs. Thomas' opinion as she related the constant growth of book circulation during the past two years. She paid a compliment to the youth of the community who, she said, "are very well behaved and more than intelligent in their reading habits."

A good library should have one book for every inhabitant, she stated, which brings Birmingham's estimated population of 12,000 within 15 of the 11,955 books; one third of the community here is registered in the library, which she has brought up to one half. The local library can take care of a community of 25,000 people, concluded Mrs. Thomas.
