

NORTON TO AID COUZENS FUND

Noted Social Worker Resigns Detroit Post To Help Children

William J. Norton, of Pleasant Ridge, secretary of the Detroit Community Fund for the past 12 years, has resigned as a member of the board of supervisors of that organization to devote his time and efforts to the Children's Fund of Michigan, created last fall by Senator James Couzens. Mr. Norton's resignation will take effect, Feb. 1.

Mr. Norton informed the directors of the Community Fund that by serving the staff of the Children's Fund of Michigan, he believes he will be better able to serve the children of the entire state.

Mr. Norton has been engaged in social work, with the exception of a short period spent in newspaper work, since his graduation from Bowdoin College in 1905. He was elected president of the National Conference of Social Work in 1925.

Mr. Norton's successor is Percival Dodge of Grosse Pointe, associate secretary of the Community Fund for several years.

JUDGE DEPLORES LACK OF RELIGION

Men, Dan A. McGaffey Tells Women Social Neglect Spiritual Duty

That religious education is being superseded by scientific and intellectual training in the public schools was deplored by Judge Dan A. McGaffey, of the Oakland County Juvenile Court, in a speech before the Oakland County Council of Women in the Community House, Tuesday.

He pleaded for the establishment of religious education in the homes.

Judge McGaffey stated his belief that crime in young children is the result, not of heredity, but of misdirected mentality. He emphasized the importance of good homes in the lives of the children, defining good homes as those in which religion is taught and lived. The juvenile home, he said, is under the direction of a man who is not a religious man, and who fords an environment of this kind, the speaker said.

Huge amounts of money are spent in the conviction and imprisonment of criminals, Judge McGaffey pointed out, education of children to prevent crime. He characterized the penal and reformatory institutions as "colleges of crime."

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DRAIN PROJECT DELAY IS ASKED
Oakland-Macomb Engineers Advocate 5 To 10 Year Postponement
Village and city engineers of municipalities served by the Red Run system of the proposed \$5,400,000 Oakland-Macomb county drain, at a meeting in Warren, Monday, advocated a postponement of from five to 10 years of the project.

H. H. Corson, village engineer of Birmingham, explained that the delay would not be considered objectionable unless it caused the state to force the individual communities to construct separate projects of their own.

While the engineers conceded that the drain is a necessity, they asked for its postponement until the heavy assessments now in the district are relieved.

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
