

## OAKLAND COUNTY NEWS

Cost of hiring a city planning expert will be studied by the Royal Oak city zoning and planning committee, it was decided at the first meeting of the committee Monday.

Albert Ayton, age 46, 23162 Hazelwood avenue, Hazel Park, pleaded guilty and waived examination when he was arraigned before Justice Robert C. Baldwin Friday afternoon charged with violation of the prohibition laws. Ayton was bound over to the Oakland county circuit court under \$1,000 bond.

Edward Sawyer submitted his resignation from the Berkeley village commission to Clerk Edward Pardee this morning giving his removal from the village as reason for his action. The resignation, effective at once, must be acted upon by the village commission.

He was a widower and had been employed by a real estate company in Birmingham. The remains were taken to Voorhees Funeral Home and will be sent to Chicago for burial.

Commission Officially Names Cherry Court At Birmingham

Cherry court, a street 20 feet wide, extending south from Brown street to 120 feet west of Stanley street, is now an official thoroughfare of the Village of Birmingham as a result of a resolution adopted by the Village Commission Monday night.

Cherry Court is dedicated on the original plat of the village but was never officially indicated as a village street until Monday. There are three houses on the street but none of them is numbered. The resolution, presented by Commissioner Robert E. Allen, was presented upon a petition of the residents on the street for a street marker.
