RECORD SET BY BALDWIN DEBATE TRIO

Victory Over Dearborn Orators Places Team In State Running

ENTER ELIMINATION

This year Baldwin High School has had the best debating record for the preliminary series winning all four debates by a 3-0 decision.

The final debate of the series was contested with Dearborn High at Dearborn High School the afternoon of Friday, Jan. 24 in which the Baldwin trio upheld the negative case of the current question "Resolved that a judge or board of judges be appointed in place of the jury to determine all cases in the state and municipal courts of the State of Michigan."

Baldwin's team which is composed of three girls who have debated during the entire season: Peggy Hart, Mary Hutchinson, and Geraldine Kessler, was given the decision by Professor Frederick B. McKay who acted as single critic judge. Through winning this debate, Baldwin is qualified for entrance in the elimination series as well as in the competition for a University of Michigan wall plaque which is given for excellence in debating.

The next debate, which will mark the opening of the elimination series will be held Feb. 14 at which time only sixty-four schools out of the 266 original entrants will participate. In each debate of the elimination series the number of schools is decreased by one-half which means that a school must win each debate.

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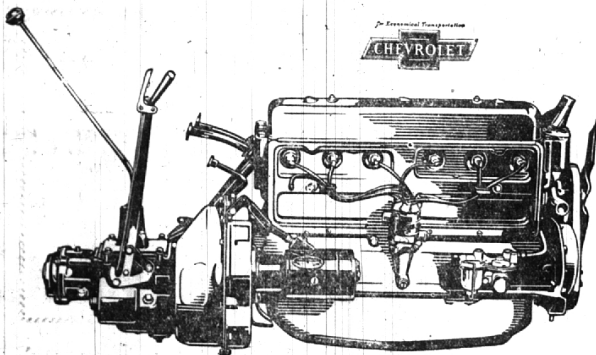
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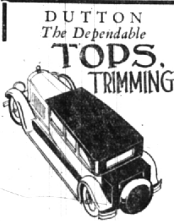
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
