### FUNERAL IS HELD FOR F. W. YOUNG

Resident's Brother Dies Near Fishing Shanty On Lake Erie

Funeral services were held Saturday at Toledo, O., for Frederick W. Young, 57 years old, a brother of Mrs. E. J. Young, of 191 Worth street, who died suddenly Thursday at his fishing shanty on Put-in-Bay. Mr. Young, who was born on a farm nine miles west of Pontiac, lived in and near Birmingham for several years before entering railroad service. He is survived by his widow and a son, Frederick W., 20 years old, of Toledo.

Death was caused by heart disease. According to his son, who had gone with him on a fishing trip, Mr. Young, who, until his death was proprietor of the shoe department of the Thompson Hudson store in Cleveland, complained of pains in his side a few days before his death but declared that he did not believe them serious.

In the absence of his son who had gone for food supplies, Mr. Young died on the ice near his fishing shanty. The return trip to the mainland, with his body was accomplished at great peril by the party which had to drive in open automobiles over Lake Erie in sub-zero weather.

WARREN P. GIBSON, D. D. S. 237 North Woodward Avenue. How long have you been in this type of business?

I have been practicing dentistry since 1915.

What led you to choose Birmingham as your location?

For years I have carried a vision of an ideal practice closely associated with home and recreation. After a long period of study and observation, I decided that Birmingham was richly endowed with these possibilities.

What do you think of Birmingham's business future?

Birmingham has a very bright business future, built upon a very substantial and conservative growth.

What do you consider Birmingham's greatest need?

I believe that one of the great needs of Birmingham is civic consciousness and civic pride, developed to the point where donation toward civic improvements and developments by its citizens both morally and financially will become a known fact. Toronto, Canada is an example.

Are you desirous of keeping the village of a residential nature?

By all means keep Birmingham a residential village, with suitable laws to control its growth toward that end.

What factors will encourage more buying in Birmingham?

I realize that the divided militia existing among many of our citizens, due to the fact that their business is in either Detroit or Pontiac, works a material hardship among our merchants. We are all victims of this situation.

Our problem rests in ourselves to change that habit either by courteous service and unexcelled merchandise, commensurate with the demand.

In what way can the merchants make the village a better shopping area?

I agree with a suggestion made in past papers that our parking limit and conditions work a distinct hardship on patrons as well as merchants.

I think that the parking limit should be extended to an hour during the quieter periods of the day.

What growth do you expect of Birmingham in the next five years?

I will leave this question to the Detroit Edison, Consumers Power Co., and the village manager.

Have you any "pet" idea that you would like to see manifested in the village?

I feel that Birmingham should have at least one Dental Clinic located in one of our schools to provide dentistry for those children whose parents cannot afford this necessity. The Detroit Clinics are a good example. A tremendously important service is being done there, and I am sure we have a distinct need for such an institution here.

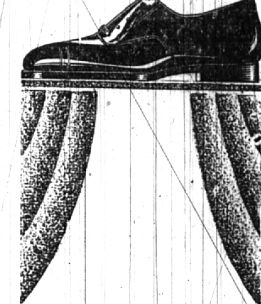
