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CONTINUE WINTER MUSICAL RIDES

Events At Bloomfield Open Hunt Club Scheduled For Each Thursday

Winter activities at the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club, which commenced Jan. 1 with a musical ride and gymkhana, will be continued every Thursday afternoon in the indoor ring.

On Jan. 9, the musical ride will take place early in the afternoon, after which the horses and riders will be classified. The next Thursday, the Members' Jumping Competition will start, to be held after the weekly musical ride throughout the season.

An elaborate system of scoring will determine the winner for the season. Only horses ridden in the weekly musical rides will be eligible, and handicaps will be assigned at the discretion of the committee. First, second, and third trophies will be presented respectively by Mr. W. G. Lorch, Mr. Edward P. Hammond, and Mr. C. C. Winnikham.

The children of members will also have horsemanship competitions during the winter. Three trophies will be presented to the winners of classes A, B and C, representing different grades of experience. Competition will start Saturday morning at 10 a. m., and will be open only to children who have attended regularly the Saturday morning rides.

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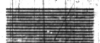
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
