INJUNCTION SOUGHT ON GAS STATION LEASE

The Motor Inn, Inc., has been named defendant in an injunction suit started Tuesday in the United States Circuit Court by land County Circuit Court by Henry Metz and W. J. Maloney to prevent the corporation from taking steps before a Circuit Court Commissioner to eject the plaintiffs from the Briar Banks Hills Village. The plaintiffs claim title in the station, obtained from Orla S. Price, formerly of the Motor Inn, Inc., does not expire until 1932.

The plaintiffs further seek a permanent injunction to restrain the defendants from interfering with the operation of the station during the lease period. The defendants claim they now control the property and have served notice on Metz and Maloney that they want permanent possession of it.

WHO'S WHO AND TIMELY VIEWS

Amendment To Give States Right Of Controlling Liquor Proposed

(Robert Low Bacon was born at Boston, Mass., July 27, 1882. He is a graduate of Harvard, where he studied law. After being with the U. S. treasury department for a year, he entered the banking business. A delegate to the Republican national convention in 1920, he was elected to congress in 1922, from the first New York district, and has been returned each term since. He served on the Mexican border, in the World war, and holds the Distinguished Service Medal.)

I GLADLY ADMIT that the present intolerable conditions in much good. It has, for example, eliminated the saloon, which none wishes to see restored. But it has provoked many new evils. The speakeasy and bootlegger now infest the land.

The present situation is deplorable. The criminal element has become a well-financed industry due to the swollen profits of the illicit liquor traffic. The problem involved in prohibition has not been solved.

With Chairman Wickham, of the president's law enforcement commission, I do not believe it can be solved by armies of federal police and more jails. The fine common sense of the American people must and will find a solution that will retain the benefits of present prohibition and at the same time eliminate the brood of evils that the present system has created.
