

UNEMPLOYED CENSUS GIVEN

Birmingham Shows 130 Not Working; 1833 in Total For All County

Preliminary unemployment announcements, subject to correction, from the office of D. D. Fisher, supervisor of the Fifteenth Census for the 14th district of Michigan, are issued today. Birmingham has 130 persons, usually working out a gainful occupation, who were reported on an unemployment schedule as without a job, able to work, and looking for a job. More than one-fourth of all persons reported from ten townships and nine municipalities of the county are in the city of Ferndale, which has 504 unemployed. These figures are only preliminary. Mr. Fisher announces, and is supplemented later by data for other classes of persons at work at the time of the census, such as those who had a job but were sick or temporarily laid off. Anon township has the greatest number of unemployed listed for townships, with a total of 260, in-

It is possible that some form of ticket will have to be issued to swimmers to spread them out in various periods instead of concentrating them all at one period, Mr. Engel says, although no definite plan is yet announced.

Seek To Continue Livernois Highway

Plans of the Metropolitan Planning and Zoning Committee, consisting of representatives of many municipalities in the Detroit area, to continue Livernois avenue northward to the village of Clawson, tentatively were approved by Birmingham officials here Monday night. The route proposed is to cross Woodward avenue at the Eleven Mile road, thence to Clawson. Relief for traffic from southwest Detroit to points north is the reason for the improvement, it is said. Livernois now stops at Pleasant Edge Village. Since Birmingham is only remotely concerned with the project, the village commission Monday night upon the suggestion of commissioner Charles E. Lewis, approved the plan in a manner that does not obligate Birmingham in any official way to lend financial assistance. To this end, the subject was laid on the table for two weeks, until president Harry Allen and commissioner Lawrence Hulbert, who were not present Monday night, have an opportunity to view the plan.

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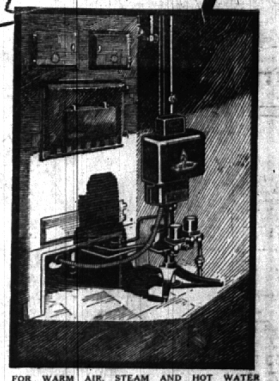
