RE-ELECTED TO SCHOOL BOARD

Over 400 Votes Cast At Annual Meeting Monday; Reports Given Out OVER MILLION SPENT

Dr. W. G. Hutchinson, of Lake Park, was elected to a three-year term on the Birmingham Board of Education over Melvin J. Deer, of Riverock avenue, by a majority of 212 votes, at the annual school district meeting here Monday. A tabulation of votes showed the following results: Hutchinson, 310; Deer, 98; votes spoiled, 2; making a total of 410 votes cast. Dr. Hutchinson will take the place on the board vacated by W. H. Palmer, who was elected to office 20 years ago. Mr. Corryell was a member of the board continuously from 1910 till Monday except for the years 1918 and 1919; he was president from 1910 till 1918 and again from 1924 till 1930.

The vote this year equalled only about half the vote cast last year when W. W. Jones and Roy A. Palmer defeated Mrs. Cora Farrar; but it showed a great increase

CONTRACT SIGNED BY-MISS GRIFFITH

Hostess, Mrs. Shain Declares Differences Now Cleared Up, and Settled

During a temporary lull in Community House administration after the Board of Directors, Mrs. Shain and Miss Griffith met Saturday night and signed a statement whereby Miss Griffith was retained resident hostess for another year at a salary of \$100 per month, in return for which she is to pay the house \$100 per week. At the office meeting, the Board voted to offer Miss Griffith the position of hostess with no welfare work, a reduction of \$100 per month from the salary she had previously received. Miss Griffith replied to Mrs. Shain the night of July 8, saying that she would accept the offer if she might have her afternoons free. Mrs. Shain at that time declared that no action was to be taken.
