

# WOMEN'S STATE GOLF CONTEST

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Members of the Birmingham district golf clubs are establishing fine scores in the state tournament which will under way at the West-ern Golf and Country club. The big upset of the tournament was furnished by Mrs. L. P. Dodd, of the Birmingham Golf club, who defeated Miss Mary Holton, of Battle Creek, the state champion, Tuesday in the first round of the championship flight, one up.

Other district players who were victorious in the first round of the championship flight were Mrs. Olin Finney of Oakland Hills, who defeated Mrs. G. H. Harris three and two; and Mrs. Stewart Harney of Oakland Hills, who defeated Mrs. E. M. Connor three and four. Two Birmingham players went down in the championship flight—Mrs. Rex J. Lee losing to Mrs. S. R. Small five and three; and Mrs. C. W. Van Wormer losing to Mrs. W. G. Hoy on the 29th hole.

In the first flight Tuesday, Mrs. J. H. DeVisser of Oakland Hills won from Mrs. R. M. Ferguson six and five; and Mrs. C. G. Fredmore, of Forest Lake, defeated Mrs. G. E. Bedford, six up. Miss Adelle Denk, Oakland Hills' 17 year old star, lost in the second flight to Mrs. E. K. Sprague. In the third flight, Mrs. G. H. Schmidlauer of Birmingham Golf club was victorious over Mrs. G. A. Wettlaufer, two and one.

Mrs. Dodd was able to win over the state champion by her consistently good putting and Miss Holton's erratic playing. She won on the 18th after sinking a nine-foot putt to give her a men's par four on the hole after Miss Holton who had trailed from the seventh pulled up even by winning the 16th and 17th.

The Battle Creek mts got away a powerful drive on the final hole but was unfortunate in that it stopped in the second trap well down to the right. She was able to get little distance coming out but a splendid iron shot left her not more than 15 feet from the flag, a putt she barely missed before her opponent made her.

Miss Holton sided both the ninth and eighth and lost them to be down at the start of the tenth. Both played well for the first half of the second nine. Mrs. Dodd winning the thirteenth with a men's par four and losing the fourteenth to the Battle Creek girl's four, all in a par in any man's league.

Passed Up Good Chance  
While Miss Holton lost on the eighteenth, the long fifteen also went a long way toward bringing about her defeat. She put a ball in the creek after being in a good position in two then wound up by missing a putt under two feet, as did Bedford, six up. The result was a tie.

## TWO MORE CARILLON RECITALS TO BE GIVEN BY ANTON BRES

Programs for two more in the series of carillon recitals by Anton Brees on the carillon of Christ Church Cranbrook tomorrow and next Wednesday evenings are announced. Mrs. M. Brees, who is bellmaster of the Mountain Lake Singing Tower, Florida, and professor of musicology at the Curtis Institute of Music, Philadelphia, will close the series Sept. 17. He will officiate at the dedication of the Cranbrook bells on Sept. 20, 1928, and this is his second tour.

Motorists are asked to shut off motor and lights as soon as possible after parking, and, if necessary, to leave before the end of the recital, to do so only between numbers. The bells are best heard at distance of between five and 1,000 feet from the tower.

The Christ Church carillon has six-two bells covering four complete chromatic octaves and is the largest on the North American continent. Total weight is 9,408 pounds, the smallest 4,000 pounds.
