

### SOFTBALL, TENNIS GAMES ANNOUNCED

Village Playground Director Invites Men To Enter Schedule

Persons interested in entering a tennis tournament sponsored by the village recreation director, M. H. Smiley, are asked to meet him at the Y. M. C. A. headquarters any day except Saturday from 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

If a sufficient number are interested Mr. Smiley plans to hold separate tournaments for women, for men, and for boys. The boys' tournaments will be held in the afternoon and the men's and women's in the evening at 6:30.

### WILD LIFE REELS MAY BE BORROWED

Michigan's Outdoor Beauties Soon Ready For Fall Distribution

Lansing, July 16.—A four reel motion picture, depicting conservation activities of all of the ten divisions of the Department of Conservation will be ready for distribution through Michigan during the coming fall.

While most of the pictures that will be used have already been taken, the Department photographer is now in the field taking those desired to make up a complete feature.

Law enforcement activities, conservation officers in the field scenes about the state parks and of the better and lesser known beauty and historic spots of Michigan; mines, quarries, oil wells and other activities of a geological nature; fish propagation; game conservation; pollution control; activities of the land economic survey; forest fire control and prevention; reforestation; educational activities, scenes on state owned land; all will be accurately and attractively pictured.

The film will be incorporated in the Department loan service with several other reels depicting Michigan wild life and conservation activities. These films are loaned free of charge on schools, sportsmen's and other clubs, churches and any organization of a non-commercial nature.

This film loan service was organized last December and since that time films have been loaned at the rate of 50 to 70 loans a month in every part of the state.

The completed films now being loaned are—"Michigan Mammals" 2 reels; "Wild Wint' Mammals" 2 reels; "Wild Wint' Birds" 2 reels; "Lions and Lumber," 1 reel; "Wonder Isle," (Isle Royale) 1 reel; "Michigan Moose," 1 reel. The films are furnished in both the 16mm and 10mm sizes.

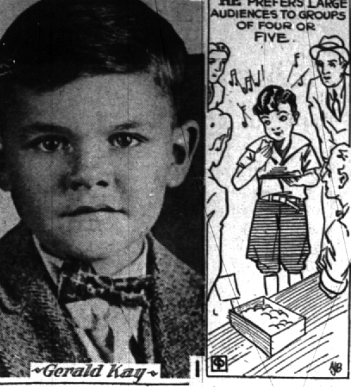

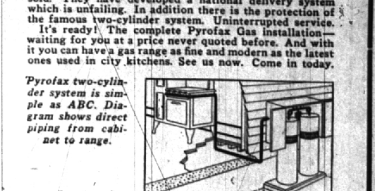
